ANENT LAW ENFORCEMENT.

Says a correspondent of The New
Voice:—

"Why does not the Prohibition
party present some plan of law en-
forcement? It being universally con-
ceded that the best way to get bet-
ter law is to enforce the law we
have. Are we not neglecting a very
important phase of work, and do we
not thus give advantages to other
methods of agitation, as, for ex-
ample, the Anti-Saloon League?"

The New Voice makes the follow-
ing reply:—

"In our way of looking at it, the
first thing to be considered in the
question of law enforcement, as re-
lated to the saloon, is whether we
have any laws that are really worth
enforcing. Suppose that the dram-
shop act of the State of Indiana were
enforced, what would be the result?

The saloons would stop selling on
Sunday; they would close for cer-
tain hours during the night, but for
six days of the week the saloon
would be a stench in the nostrils of
decency, a menace to the welfare of
every law-abiding citizen, and the
murderer of virtue and honesty.

Millions of dollars would still be di-
verted from the channels of legiti-
mate trade. Thousands of men would
still die drunkards' deaths, wives
would be beaten, little children
would be starved, and homes would
be ruined. Suppose that New York's
famous Raines law were really en-
forced? Why, it would come to pass
that no one could sell liquor upon
the Sabbath day, unless he puts
something of the nature of food up-
on the table with it, and no one
could keep a place for the sale of
liquor open during the night unless
he paid a special tax for doing so;
and no one could sell liquor to a
minor. But it would still be possible
to sell to men and women, to turn
the brightness of day into the night
of sorrow in thousands of homes, and
to take food from the tables of mil-
lions of the poor. Work that leaves
such things as this possible, may
perhaps be commendable in a cer-
tain way, but is far from satisfying
the need of the hour.

In the second place it seems to us
one ought to ask whether the re-
strictive laws now existing concern-
ing the saloon CAN be enforced.
The answer of experience is that
they cannot under existing condi-
tions. They were not made to be
enforced, and the whole machinery
of law enforcement, from constable
to circuit judge, is in the hands of
political parties, who are so deeply
in debt to the saloon that they dare
do nothing against it. Occasionally
by eternal vigilance, local Prohibition
is made successful, but if there
is an instance of the successful en-
forcement of restrictive legislation
against the saloon, it has failed to
come under our notice. The refer-
ence to the Anti-Saloon League is
not wholly fortunate, since that or-
ganization's much vaunted "law en-
forcement" work, exists largely on
paper.

In the third place, we are by no
means certain that there is any
truth at all in the notion that the
best way to get a good law is to en-
force a bad law or defective law.
Upon the contrary, there is much to
justify the opinion that the so-called
restrictive features of the liquor
laws have acted as poultices upon
public sentiment, and that every
time that you make the people be-
lieve that they can restrict the
liquor traffic, by so much you quiet
their demand for the prohibition of
the traffic. Many a good man sits
quiet in his home and salves his
conscience, which would goad him
to do something for the prohibition
of the liquor traffic, by the fact that
he has given a dollar or two to some
enforcement scheme that has proved
another failure.

Upon the whole we answer our
correspondent with a quotation
from these columns of some months
ago: 'It is a cure, not a beauty patch,
that we are looking for.'

At a mass meeting of taxpayers of
Melrose Park, a suburb of Chicago,
resolutions were adopted censuring
the trustees who voted to reduce the
saloon license from \$1000 to \$500, and
appointing a committee of nine citi-
zens to wage war on saloon keepers
who violate the state or village laws.

Among bills introduced into the
Pennsylvania Legislature is one
amending the liquor law, so as to
prevent dealers from selling to wom-
en, to be taken from the premises;
the penalty is \$50 to \$500 fine and
twenty to ninety days in jail.
