In July the debt of the United States increased \$3,737,806.

London, England, has adopted oil as fuel for its fire engines.

The strike has invaded Manila. About 7000 cigarmakers are out.

No educational facilities whatever provided for 18,000,000 Russian children.

On an average 800 persons are annually killed by lightning in the United States.

The farms of the United States on June 1st, 1900, numbered 5,739,657, and were valued at \$16,674,690,247.

Sixteen thousand four hundred laborers on the average find employment daily at the docks and principal wharves in London.

The apple crop in Nova Scotia promises to be exceptionally large this year. Probably between two and three hundred thousand barrels will be available.

Liquor and Foreign Armies.

In the Boer Army the drinking of brandy was forbidden, and the introduction of spirituous liquors into the camp was prevented as much as possible. "From these regulations," our correspondent, who was with the army, says, "we have obtained the best results. In all weather our people have sat in the saddle and traveled hundreds of miles with scarcely the loss of a single man. There were no uniforms manufactured according to the teaching of hygiene. Every one went clothed just as he would go about his work in time of peace. Many had not even one warm cloak, and yet we endured the fiery heat of the African day and the following piercing cold of the night without injury to health. We were often for months under no roof and in no bed, but no 'stomach warmer' was ever handed out."

THE SECRET OF BOERS' ENDURANCE.

"I have, during the campaign, asked various physicians their opinion on the point. They are almost universally of the opinion that the wonderful power of endurance of the Boer army has in great part been due to their total abstinence from spirituous drinks.

"In the Sudan the Sirdar prohibited all alcoholic liquors. A consignment of several hundred barrels of beer, sent by a speculative sutler from Cairo to Wady Halfa, was quickly sent down the river. Some Greeks smuggled, into Berber, by caravan, from Suakim, a large supply of a concoction called Scotch whisky, but which, it was said, had been manufactured in Alexandria from pine and potato spirit, and which, when swallowed, would burn holes in the membranes of the throat. Hundreds of cases were seized by order of the commander-in-chief, the bottles broken, and the vile liquor emptied on the thirsty sand. The prohibition caused very little grumbling, for even the men, who were not voluntary total abstainers, soon perceived that the destruction of the liquor was for their benefit."

Working People for Sobriety.

In connection with the approaching application of local option in Boston, the Rev. Edward Everett Hale writes:—

"The Boston people have at this moment a little object lesson in Greater New York, which is worth attention. The enemies of Mr. Seth Low, and of the reform movement which made him mayor, have looked forward with glee to the unpopularity, certain, as they supposed, which would overwhelm any magistrate who enforced the Sunday closing law in the city of New York."

"The German vote" was sure to be thrown against any one who did not give a "Sunday club" to the German beer drinker. By way of showing how tremendous the opposition would be to Sunday closing, some of the newspapers adopted the excellent method of voting, which, according to one, will be the election method of the future. They sent stamped cards to the voters of the tenement regions, on which the voters were to write "Yes" or "No" as they did or did not favor Sunday bar rooms.

"It was expected that an enormous avalanche of 'Yes' would overwhelm all opposition. But, to everybody's surprise, it turned out that the tenement house was more eager for Sunday closing than the regions of palaces and tenderloin. The avalanche was an avalanche of No! The voter did not want that his boy or girl should loaf into a bar room on Sunday and spend half the day there. The voter's wife did not want him to do so. And thus, as the careful reader of popular journals sees, the same writers who wanted the voice of the people applied in this business, six months ago, are now sure that this is no question for a referendum."

The old superstition that grog is a good thing for men before, during, or after a march, has been proved by scientific men of all nations to be a fallacy, and is still maintained by men who mistake the cravings arising solely from habit for the promptings of nature. The use of spirits in cold weather has been well tested during the various Polar expeditions, the medical officers of which condemn it as a preventive against cold.

In case persons suffer from cold feet at night I would advise the bathing of the feet in cold water before going to bed and having a hot water bag always at hand.

Lettuce, celery, spinach, onions are all vegetables especially valuable to a person of nervous temperament, and milk hot or cold is invaluable.

A great deal of misdirected effort in this blundering world is due to the fact that people are compelled to engage in work which they dislike, when just around the corner, so to speak, is work which they might love. Ambitious parents decree that the lad who would make a painter, whose eye for color and form is true or whose soul responds and fingers thrill to the vibrating chords of melody, shall instead enter a counting room and be apprenticed to a business for which he has no aptitude.

Similarly, a boy who would succeed in farming or in the carpenter's shop is destined to a liberal profession and compelled to undergo a long course of training for this, which, owing to his lack of fitness, is almost abortive in its results. Half the failures and defeats in life may be attributed to the placing of the round peg in the square hole. Men and women are forced to work at that which they dislike and which does not enlist their highest powers.—Harper's Bazar.
