MARITIME WINTER FAIR.

GOOD EXHIBITS AND A USEFUL PROGRAMME.

The first annual show, to be conducted in the Maritime Provinces, was held at Amherst, N.S., Dec. 17th, 18th and 19th, and drew a large and interested attendance, and was a pronounced success.

When Hon. Sydney Fisher and Mr. F. W. Hodson, Dominion Live Stock Commissioner, one year ago, secured cheap fares from the Maritime Provinces to the Ontario Provincial Fair at Guelph, and invited some three score of the leading stockmen of the Maritime Provinces to attend there, they kindled a desire for practical education in the East, which, during the past six months, has, with the help of the Minister, Mr. Hodson and the Provincial Governments, resulted in the holding of a show that for educational value stands second only to the Guelph Exhibition.

For a start the show was a decided success. Ninety five fat cattle, eighty nine sheep and forty hogs, with a fine display of dressed poultry filled the buildings provided, and some as fine beasts were shown as have been brought out this year; among them the grade Hereford steer, owned by W. W. Black, Amherst, which took the sweepstakes in the fat class at the Pan-American, and a pure bred two-year-old Aberdeen-Angus heifer, owned by H. Stairs, Kings Co., N.S., that weighed 1430 pounds live weight, and dressed out 879 pounds. These animals were excelled by yet others in the show, the sweepstakes being taken by a pure bred Shorthorn belonging to C. A. Archibald of Truro, N. S.

A considerable number of Agricultural Societies sent delegates to the meetings, and notwithstanding their free admissions, and that no charges were made for ladies and children, \$326.00 was taken at the door.

Hon. Sydney Fisher personally attended the show and gave some excellent practical addresses. His presence and counsel did much to encourage the promoters and to incite them to renewed efforts for next year.

Dr. James Mills of the Ontario Agricultural College, gave an address upon the need of Agricultural education, which for force, sound sense and eloquence has never been excelled upon a Maritime Province platform. Did his time permit him to give such an address at a dozen different places in the three Provinces, there would be established within the next eighteen months a Maritime Agricultural College.

Prof. G. C. Creelman, Superintendent of Ontario Farmers' Institutes gave Institute workers in the provinces great assistance by his practical addresses and suggestions.

The illustrated lectures in the ring so attracted visitors at the Show, that hundreds were unable to get within the sound of the speaker's voice.

By the agency of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, and with the personal supervision of both Hon. Mr. Fisher, and Mr. F. W. Hodson, exceptionally able judges and lecturers were taken to Amherst, in the persons of the following gentlemen:—For cattle, Prof. Geo. E. Day, Guelph; for sheep, Alex. Smith, Maple Lodge, Ont.; for swine, J. E. Brethour, Burford, Ont. John Jackson, Abingdon, Ont., was also in attendance to assist in the sheep classes, and Wm. Dryden, of Brooklin, son of Ontario's popular Minister of Agriculture took charge of the slaughter tests. In the poultry department there was a galaxy of talent, and it was thoroughly appreciated by the visitors, for this part of the Show was constantly thronged with an eager crowd of enquirers. Messrs. Hare and Gilbert, of Ottawa, and W. R. Graham, of Guelph, with Jos. Landry, of Truro, showed and explained all departments of the work—hatching chickens in the incubator; keeping them in the brooder; fattening them in crates; the use of the cramping machine, and killing and packing for the English market were all shown and explained.

All who visited the Exhibition went away well pleased and active arrangements are now in progress among the officers of the Maritime Breeders' Association for a large and better Show next year.

SELLING GIRLS IN NIGERIA.

DEALERS PUSH BUSINESS JUST LIKE A HORSE DEALER.

Business connected with the sale of some silver took me one day to the house of a slave dealer who had some twelve or fourteen very engaging females to dispose of. Entering the house through the heavy pillared, low be-matted porch, I found myself, when my eyes had grown accustomed to the subdued light and the fleecy smoke of the burning pipes, in a large, square, hall-shaped room. The young women were squatting about on skins and mats, doing up one another's hair, touching up one another's eyes with

kwoll (black antimony powder), laughing, talking, singing, and to all appearances thoroughly enjoying themselves, notwithstanding that they had only recently been torn from the bosom of their families. When the dealer had looked at the silver I brought with me he directed my attention to his stock, and, after a few observations relative to their place of origin, called up two or three of the girls and tried to push business, expatiating upon their points just as a horse dealer might do in this country. One was cunning in the preparation of the perfumes of the country, in the blending of civet and frankincense and myrrh, just the wife for a wealthy Ba Ture (white man) like me. Another could sing and dance; all were clean and well favored. After listening to the dealer for some time I told him very plainly that I did not require a female slave. "Ah," he replied, "then I know what you want, and have just the article to suit you." And a girl, half Arab, half Sudani, was immediately produced from a different room. The dealer was sure she would suit me—he was aching to get that silver without paying currency for it—he would let me have her cheap; she wasn't everybody's money. "No, she is not," I readily admitted, adding rather more forcibly, "she isn't mine, for instance."—*Empire Magazine.*

AN AWFUL FAILURE.

One of our ministers this week visited Fred Lee Rice, the only one of the trio of bank robbers now alive, and who rests under sentence of 21 years' imprisonment for robbery, and awaits trial on the charge of murder. Believing, as we do, that undue publicity given to such notorious characters and their wrong doings works untold evil, we forbear spreading the story of their crimes. But as we listened to the account of the interview, and the description of the prisoner, and part of the story of his life, the thought that most strongly affected us was, what a sad and awful failure to the splendid possibilities of a human life is here revealed. Leaving aside the thought of all the crimes committed, crimes that probably broke nearly every command in the decalogue, is it not a most deplorable and awful crime that a life to which there came perhaps more than the average of advantages and possibilities, should be brought to a close so abruptly, facing the gallows with nothing good or worthy or ennobling to look back upon, no record but what had better be forgotten save as a warning? The Hebrew writers were true in their conceptions when they so frequently made use of the word for "sin" that means a failure or a missing of the mark. Can there be any sin greater than the perversion of high and holy powers to low and unworthy ends.—*Christian Guardian.*

Development Beyond the Great Lakes.

A new stage in the development of the Canadian West, and in the means of communication between East and West, was marked last week, when Hon. E. J. Davis drove a silver spike in the completed line of the Canadian Northern Railway connecting Port Arthur with Winnipeg. The promoters of this railway believe it will be more than a connecting link between Lake Superior and the capital of Manitoba; they are counting on it becoming a link in a second Canadian line across the continent. It is believed, furthermore, that the demands of traffic will, within ten years, compel the double tracking of the line just built. This opinion is based on the fact that the road will have not only a heavy grain but a heavy timber and mineral traffic as well. In this connection, it is significant that the last spike was formed of silver taken from Silver Mountain, in North-Western Ontario. Further evidence of the development now

A RACE AGAINST TIME.

The Humane Society has entered a vigorous protest against the proceedings of a man who proposed to ride a horse from New York to Chicago in a race against time. The idea was to compel the horse, if possible, to average one hundred and twenty-five miles a day.

This sort of thing is on a level with the six-day bicycle races which have created unpleasant sensations recently. There is no sense in it. Horse-racing on a track is an entirely different thing. The thoroughbred usually enjoys the performance as much as the spectators, if one can judge by appearances. He is a creature carefully bred by man for this express purpose. His lithe body, strong muscles, sensitive nerves, and almost human intelligence, are all adapted to the business of speeding over the track, and he instinctively seeks the pleasure of exercising his powers. This is natural to every creature. The athlete enjoys using his muscles; the mechanic delights in doing a good bit of work; the artist revels in working out a conception. The hunting dog is as eager for the hunt as the sportsman. It is all part of the same plan. Absolute laziness is foreign to the laws of the universe. A man or a beast in perfect condition delights in the work for which he is fitted. If he does not, it is a sign either that he is not in the right work, or that something is wrong with him.

But six-day bicycle races and long-distance horse races are an entirely different matter. They are trials of endurance, and while the power of endurance is a good thing, there are plenty of occasions on which it can be developed without cruelty to animals or man. When a dam breaks, and it is necessary for somebody to ride night and day to warn people of a flood, there is no thought of the strain; but it is likely to fall on one not particularly qualified for it. There is no useful purpose to be served by such artificial trials of strength.

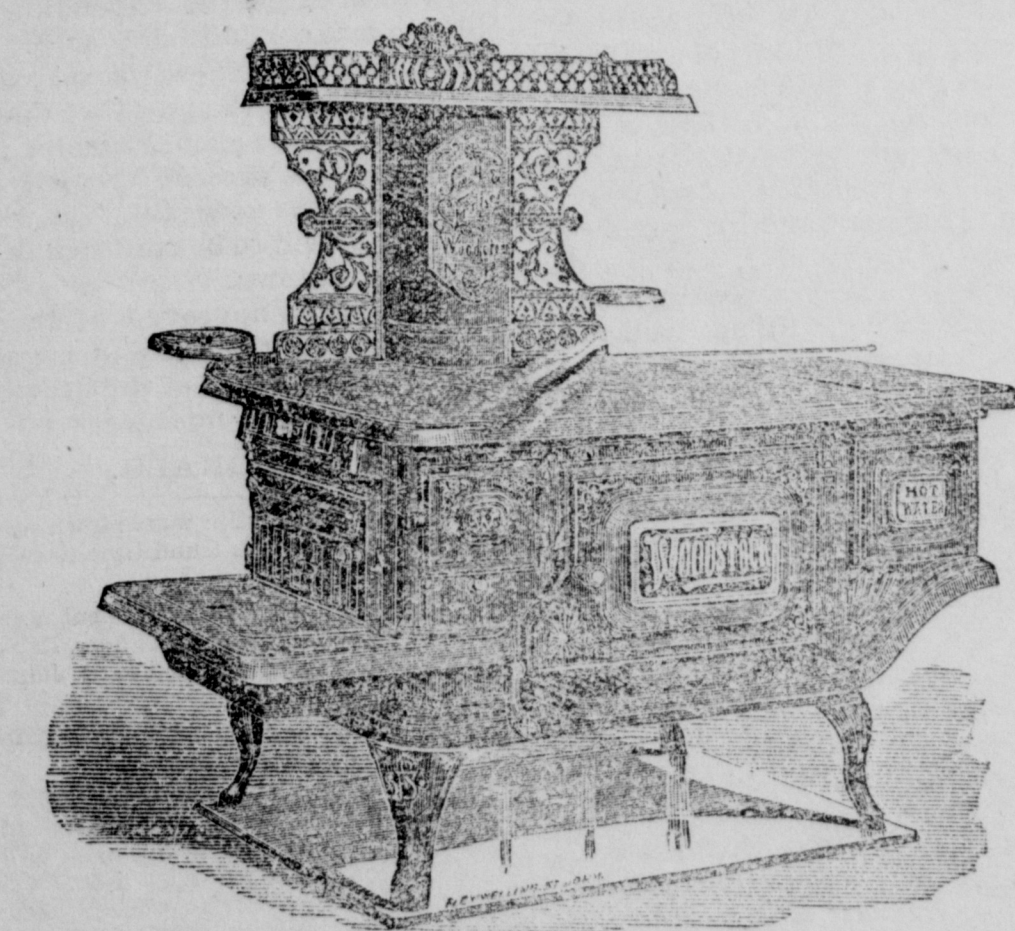
