Appeal to Farmers.

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel: Please publish the following in your paper under the heading "Appeal to Farmers."

I have closely reckoned the profits obtained from my cows by patronizing the Car. Co. Creamery and Butter Co. for the season of 1901, and am not only thoroughly dissatisfied, but disgusted. Take the month of June for an example, when we got 16 cents for butter fat. In the first place, 80 lbs of butter fat, when made into butter, produces 100 lbs butter; you will find on reckoning, this reduces the price of the butter to the farmer to 12 four-fifths cents. Add to this the cost of hauling milk to skimming station which is one cent more per pound, we have 11 four-fifths cents. Add to this one cent more for loss of buttermilk and we have 10 four-fifths cents. Add to this the skim milk when brought back sour (or will be before the night feed is given to calves or pigs) which when fed is often worse than none, I ask any intelligent farmer what do you get for your work. Does the Car. Co. Butter Co. expect to increase its volume of business by giving such a (big price) to the farmer. I know of men who patronized them last year but will not do so next. I will suggest a remedy for a big increase in the business of the Company. Give the farmers an average of 20 cents for butter fat, (now that the Company has got well established, and in good working order) and in less than five years they will be doing more than double the business they are doing now. Moreover your factory would be in operation more than four or five months, as at present. The farmers would put forth every effort, to increase the milk production of their cows for such a Company. Much credit is due the Government for its aid given to factories, (if too much protection has not been afforded,) which are a good thing for the farmer. Cash every month is certainly a splendid feature in connection with them. I would like to see this Company increase its business by leaps and bounds. The system is a grand one. I especially request Agriculture Societies to discuss this subject. To prove I am not altogether astray in my argument, I will quote the Annual report of the Sussex Cheese and Butter Co., held on the 14th of Jan. 1902. "The President W. W. Stockton stated the last years operations had been very satisfactory. A deficit had been paid off, a dividend on the stock was declared and there was a substantial surplus in the treasury. During 1901 there were 104 patrons, milk received 2,897,089 lbs; butter made 135,332 lbs; cheese made 2361 lbs. The average price of butter fat to patrons 21.3 cents per lb; average price of butter 21.3 cents per lb, average price of milk per 100 lbs 84 cents. The patrons also had the skim milk worth at least 15 cents per 100 lbs. Farmers, compare the returns of the two Butter factories, both in our own province. Let us hear from other farmers on this point.

A FARMER.

Letter From a Farmer.

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:

Would like to pass my opinion of the Farmer's meeting at Grafton the 10 inst; although poorly attended by the men of this profession was undoubtedly a success, and those present enjoyed the Speaker of the evening Mr. J. F. Tilley Dairy Supt. The addresses delivered by the Hon. L. P. Farris and Thos A. Peters of the Government Staff at Fredericton, were in every measure encouraging to the farmers and assured him that they were ready to help him as far as was possible. Mr. Tilley's plan of Co-operation went home very forcibly to the farmers present revealing his present position and showing the open door to success. In Mr. Tilley the farmers find a genial young man full of energy and standing ready to aid them in every possible way, being one of our own men and knowing the past and present circumstances of the farmer is in a position to understand what we want better than outside men who are in advance of us; his experience in the Dairy Business in this County, before being called by the government to accept his present position enables him to see what lines we have improved on, and where we need improvement. The writer was glad to see the farmers present show interest in the Institute work and make further arrangements to hold meetings, where they can get together and exchange ideas. Also to consider the advisability of further improving their stock so as to be able to furnish the consumer with a first class article which in return he can afford to pay him better prices for. Looking over the St. John market a few days ago we notice "Ontario Beef" 7 to 8 cents, Country Killed 3 to 6 cents not wanted, what is the reason of this state of affairs? A person traveling over Carleton County last October would find each farmer with from 2 to 6 head of cat-

tle that he would gladly dispose of at from 12 to 20 dollars per head. Again we ask the question why could not this beef supply the St. John market? Instead of sending to Ontario. Simply it was not what the consumer wanted, and until he gets the right kind of stock and furnishes the right kind of goods the market will continue to read as above, much to the loss of N. B. Farmers. I am not condemning the Dairy, it is one of the most if not the most profitable line of farming. Beef is not the only thing that we are behind on. Production of the bacon hog so far has been given no consideration what ever. The Ontario farmers, last year got about the same per pound for live hogs, as we got for dressed, because they catered to the demand of the packers and are furnishing them with hogs which when made into bacon sells for a higher price than anything in the British market than anything in that line, and are consequently reaping their reward, all obtained through co-operation. Our farmers are not producing as many hogs as they might. Their hogs are kept too closely housed and consequently have to be fed more grain and milk than is profitable. With green feed or good pasture a greater number can be raised at a much less cost per head. Cheap feed and a greater production should be the motto of each farmer. Thanking you for valuable space. Nictau, Feb. 2, 1902.

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:

Our hunter, Toop Howard, was chased by a moose yesterday. He fought bravely for a while, but finally had to take to a tree, as the king of the forest made a charge at him. He was a scared boy when he came to camp and swears he shall go no more a hunting. Our middleweight, Sylvester, has been the champion so far; he has knocked out three of the boys in a very few rounds. Our boys have made a very nice song up about the camp and as we have some very lovely singers here we have some very enjoyable evenings. Rob Brown, who tended sled, is not feeling very well at present; he was made to bark a few logs yesterday for the first; he is a kind of a queer chap, just the same, and helps to sing to the boys, assisted by the white headed fellow from Riley Brook. Well, as I have some work to do to-night, I will just say that all is well here at present. Perhaps you will hear from me again soon.
