BOLD BANK ROBBERY.

Sometime during Saturday night last, the Bank of New Brunswick, at East Florenceville, was broken into, the safe, supposed to be a burglar proof one, blown open and an amount of cash and valuable papers carried off. The burglars had secured a lot of carriage robes from blee. Two men living in an adjacent building heard an explosion but strange to say gave no alarm until about six o'clock Sunday morning. Deputy Sheriff Foster was at once notified and with Mr. Stewart, the bank manager, at once started on the trail of the burglars. There had bers. been rain during the night, and the tracks of the fugitives were easily perceptible in the mud, and their footsteps were traced from Florenceville to Centreville and thence to a barn at Bridgewater, which the rob- tee. bers had entered, presumably for the purpose of dividing the spoils. Here was found some of the notes and papers taken from the bank, torn into small pieces, and also a lantern taken from the bank. From here the trail was lost, but Deputy Foster rightly conjecturing that the robbers would follow the line of the B. & A. to Houlton, he and the bank manager and Deputy Sheriff Barrett of Bridgewater drove down the road for the purpose of heading them off. At what they thought was a suitable point, they secreted themselves and awaited developments. Before daylight, Monday morning, the two men came along the railway track and taking them to be the men wanted, Deputy Foster stepped out and ordered them to surrender. The answer came quickly in the shape of a volumn of oaths and a discharge of their revolvers; several shots were exchanged between the officials and criminals, but none of the shots took effect. The burglars then retired, firing until they reached the woods, where they were soon lost to view. Monday evening Deputy Foster, Deputy Hayward, Major Good, L. Fisher, H. Gray and Dr Hand drove out to a point below Littleton, hoping to trap the fugitives, but nothing could be seen or heard of them, and they returned from their bloodless and fruitless search next day. Deputy Hayward, with an Houlton official, is still on the look-out along the line of the Bangor & Aroostook railway; little hopes, however, are entertained of their being successful in the capture of the desperadoes.
