ANARCHY AND RUM.

The *Christian Nation*, discussing
Anarchy and Rum, says:—

"This nation believes that wine is a
safe companion, but the demon of the
cup laughs at the false confi-
dence of the nation that lets it live
to prey upon human lives. The murder-
er of the President came from
Nowak's saloon. The anarchists of the
Chicago Haymarket massacre came from
the saloons, and when some of them were released from the
prison at Joliet they got saloons of their
own. Schwab, who was sus-
pected of sharing in their plot, kept a
saloon in New York. Most has his
headquarters and issues his incendiary
paper, *Freedom*, from a saloon and the
writer tracked him through three saloons
one morning as Most went to his work.
As the legitimate business of the country
stood still while our President was laid
away, the saloon went on. It was the
day of its victory, while, with its red eyes,
it looked out on the streets learning at the
nation that dares to trifle with its power.
Czolgosz loses his life as the penalty of
his crime, but what of that? The saloon
is raising many children to prove to those
who have sold it the right to live, while it
robs the nations of their rulers and wives
of their husbands, that it mocks at those
that deride its power. It avails little to
hang up effigies of the assassin, the child
of the saloon, while the parent lives to
multiply his kind. Hang up the saloon,
and the race of anarchists will die. Wine
is a mocker, and it jeers at us over the tomb.

EFFECTS OF ALCOHOL.

Prof. Victor Horsley, F.R.S., lec-
turing at the London Institution,
London, Eng., on the effects of alco-
hol, said he would limit himself to
the effect which small quantities of
alcohol had upon the brain, which
was the highest part of the nervous
organization. The result of taking
alcohol in small quantities was that
it produced a slight mental quicken-
ing during the first few minutes after
it had been imbibed, but in a short
time it inevitably led to a second
stage of failure or loss of power. The
first effect of a small quantity of al-
cohol was to suspend or interfere
with the operation of the highest
part of the brain, which, translated
into popular language, meant the
loss of the controlling mechanism, as
if the brake were removed from a
wheel and it went on more quickly
than before, but not necessarily more
efficiently. Errors also became more
numerous after taking alcohol. Ex-
periments with tea showed that it
produced an acceleration at first, but
there was no paralysing effect at all.
The stimulative stage passed
away, but here was no loss of power,
and precisely the same thing had
been shown as regards coffee. All the
evidence justified him in the assertion
that, taken even in dietetic
quantities, alcohol was distinctly ac-
companied by a change of the nerv-
ous system which could not be con-
sidered beneficial.

The Liquor Traffic in the Pacific Islands.

A strong plea for the restriction of
the liquor traffic in the Pacific Is-
lands was made by Miss Margaret W.
Leitch before the Committee on In-
sular Affairs of the United States
House of Representatives.

In the course of an address Miss
Leitch said:—

"Great Britain, the greatest coloniz-
ing power in the world, has been for
many years successfully enforcing
the policy of prohibition for the
natives in the Pacific Islands under
her rule or protectorate. In Africa,
Great Britain has taken a great
stride forward. The sale to natives
of firearms and intoxicants is for-
bidden in British East Africa, in
Bechuanaland, in Basutoland, in
Rhodesia, in Natal, in the Sudan,
which was conquered by Kitchener's
victorious army of abstinents, and
in the Niger territory, recently ac-
quired from the British Niger Com-
pany.

Great Britain is pursuing this pol-
icy of protecting native races, not
only in the interest of humanity, but
in the interest of commerce, for she
has discovered the fact that the
liquor traffic destroys buying power
and the very buyers themselves. If
Dr. Paton was here he would tell you
how great is the need for the pro-
tection of the people of the Pacific
Islands. In the New Hebrides group
there are thirty islands. Twenty-
two of these are Christian islands,
inhabited by 18,000 people who have

given up heathenism and cannibal-
ism and are living as civilized and
Christian communities. But there
are from 40,000 to 60,000 natives in
the eight remaining islands who are
still living as cannibals, and the
greatest hindrance to the progress
of civilization and Christianity
among them is the liquor traffic and
the traffic in firearms, carried on by
American merchants for the sake of
private gain. It is a horrible thing
to see a savage with a gun in one
hand and a whiskey bottle in the
other, for when these natives buy
the firearms and drink the firewater
sold by our traders, savage warfare
and bloodshed result, and the lives
of not a few native Christians and of
several missionaries have been sacri-
ficed.

Dr. Paton came to this country
eight years ago and begged our Gov-
ernment to restrict American traders
by act of Congress from selling fire-
arms and intoxicants to the natives
in the same way that British traders
had for many years been successfully
restricted by act of Parliament. Our
country did not listen to his plea,
and for eight years this evil had
gone on. He came again this year,
after forty-two years of missionary
labor, after having given a daughter
and two sons as missionaries, to make
a last effort for the people whom he
loves dearer than life. I am sure it
is the wish of multitudes of people
all over this country that his plea
should be heard and that the res-
triction he asks for should be ef-
fected.

EGGS AS COINS.

In some parts of Peru—for example,
in the Province of Jaña—hen's eggs
are, says *London Tit-Bits*, circulated
as small coins, forty to fifty being
counted for a dollar. In the market-
place and in the shops the Indians
make most of their purchases with
this brittle sort of money. One will
give two or three eggs for brandy,
another for indigo, and a third for
cigars. These eggs are packed in
boxes by the shopkeepers and sent to
Lima. From Janja alone several
thousand loads of eggs are annually
forwarded to the capital.

British House of Commons, visited
