They sat in an unoccupied pew known as the "the elders' seat," and the beadle evidently thought this presumptuous. One Sunday the pew door was locked. Guthrie's companions turned away. But not so he. Regardless of the assembled congregation, he placed one hand on the door, and lightly vaulted over, his friends then following. Years afterwards, when he was called to that very church, one old parishioner was heard to observe to another: "That's the same lang student who jumped into the elders' seat lang syne."

bined French and Spanish fleet with Admiral Villeneuve drew Nelson in headlong pursuit from the West Indies. At daybreak of Oct. 21st. off Cape Trafalgar, the hostile fleet was seen from the deck of the Victory drawn up in order of battle. Nelson's preparations for action were soon made, and before noon his signal, which will be remembered as long as the British name shall endure, was greeted with three rapturous cheers throughout the fleet, "England expects that every man will do his duty." Lord Collingwood, in describing the battle, says :- "It was a severe action-no dodging or manœuvring. They formed their line with nicetly, and waited our attack with composure. They did not fire a gun till we were close to them; and we began first. Our ships were fought with a degree of gallantry which would have warmed your heart; everybody exerted themselves, and a glorious day they made of it. All did admirable, and the conclusion was grand beyond descriptioneighteen hulks of the enemy lying among the British fleet without a stick standing and the French Achille burning." Just as the Bucentaure's fire was almost silenced, the Victory ran foul of the Redoubtable, and the hooks and boom irons getting intermixed the two ships became locked alongside each other. The Redoubtable took fire, but the English sailors extinguish it by dashing buckets of water through their port holes into those of the enemy as the muzzles of their guns touched their sides. During the confusion a ball, fired from the mizzen top of the Redoubtable, struck the epaulette on Nelson's right shoulder about a quarter to one. He fell on his left side. "They have done for me at last, Hardy," he exclaimed. "My backbone is shot through." On being examined in the cockpit the wound was found to be mortal. After some hours of suffering, during which he murmured "Thank God, I have done my duty," he passed away.
