## General News Items.

It is reported from Montreal that the organization of a Canadian company with a capital of \$6,000,000 to exploit the new process of sugar refining is being contemplated.

Dairy Commissioner McConnell of Minnesota estimates that of the 800,000 cows in that State, 200,000 are absolutely worthless.

Rev. George Steele of Sackville has been elected secretary of the Methodist general conference now in session at Winnipeg.

The shipyards of Great Britain, all working together, could turn out a big battleship every day of the year.

In the Boston police court the other day a man was fined \$10 for kicking his horse and the next one up was fined \$5 for kicking his wife.

It has been estimated that from 1,500 to 2,000 women have come over will come from the east by this year's harvesters' excursions. Many of these are going to assist friends in the farming communities and few are open for engagement when they reach Winnipeg.

There is in the American Museum of Natural History a butterfly which cost its owner, the late Dr. Strecker, Reading, Pa., between \$7,500 and \$10,000. This rare insect, a female, exists only in Sierra Leone and the collector in question had to fit out an expedition and maintain it for over two years with no other object than to add the insect to his collection.

The C. P. R. annual report, just issued, makes a very satisfactory showing. The gross earnings for the year are \$37,503,053, the working expenses \$23,417,141, the net earnings \$14,035,912, and the surplus for the year \$7,709,913. The annual meeting will be held Oct. 1st. The company's land sales for the year realized \$4,442,136.

THE WORST EVIL.

I do not lose sight of other evils, I do not forget the wrongs under which our workmen suffer at the hands of greed and avarice. I have dwelt upon them in this pulpit with all the emphasis I could put into words. But in my inmost soul I do not believe that in the whole catalogue of evils there is one that touches the laboring masses more vitally than the liquor traffic. For the sake of their homes and their children and their own welfare and happiness they should combine against it and fight to the death.

A BRAVE DEED.

It is said that the tremendous struggle for victory on the heights of Inkerman, in the Crimean war, was decided by a young officer who determined to spike the gun, that was shooting down the troops with shot and shell. His brother officers tried to dissuade him. They declared that it was perfect madness, and that to make such an attempt would be to charge into the jaws of death. But the young hero replied, "If no man will stand by me I shall go alone. Who'll volunteer?" And immediately he went out from the shelter of the rising ground, where he had halted his men, and faced the battery and spiked the gun. That one brave deed turned the tide of battle in favor of the British.

DESTROY THE TRAFFIC.

Fellow men, in the great conflict that ranges in human society between good and evil, one of the deadliest wreckers of all is the saloon. It baffles legislation. It laughs at the church. It defies Christianity. It throws itself in the pathway of missions. It corrupts politics. It impoverishes labor. It strips and beggars the homes of tens of thousands of our workmen. Day and night, week in and week out, this infernal battery is belching forth its deadly missiles against all that is good, and decimating the ranks of the toiling masses. From every shop therefore, from every mill and factory, from every printing house, from every mine, from every labor organization between the seas, should go up the cry, backed up by the resolution to make it good, "Spike that gun."—Rev Dr Coyle.

DRINK AND TRADE.

At a large temperance meeting in connection with the Annual Assembly of the United Methodist Free Churches, held at Leeds, Alderman Varvell, of Exeter, presiding, Mr W S Caine, M. P., dealing with the economic outlook, as effected by the drinking habits of the people, said that he did not fear German competition. Germany competed with us mostly in rubbish. He was not afraid of Germany, for the reason that there they had conscription. But of America, he was horribly frightened. Yet British workmen, declared Mr Caine, were better than American. Lots of British workmen, indeed, had gone over to America to better themselves, and now occupied leading positions in American factories. But if Britain was to hold her own in the trade of the world, an educational system similar to that in America must be adopted, and there must be sobriety among the people. America only drank one-half what was consumed in England. Rev Jos Hocking also spoke, pointing out what had been already accomplished by temperance reformers. The Church, the Army, and the medical world had all been converted, he said.

TO IMPROVE THE BUSINESS.

Even the wholesale liquor sellers of the United States think that under present legislative conditions the sale of liquor is not an elevating occupation, and that it is carried on in some cases by parties whose reputation is not of the highest character. The liquor sellers propose to remedy this evil by changes in the liquor laws. The following are their resolutions relating to this matter:—"We favor the passage by all of the States of license laws having for their main object the elimination from our ranks of all disreputable characters and the establishment of qualifications for license to retail liquors such as good order and the proper observance of law may demand.

The president of the National Wholesale Liquor Dealers' Association is hereby authorized and instructed to appoint a committee of three or more members to formulate a model license law, and to submit the same to the consideration of all the legislatures of our various States."

## THE MEN OF ENERGY.

Life is a school, and it is only through its struggles that we learn nature, ourselves and our fellow-men. It is only through repeated falls the child learns to stand alone and walk. He who is the architect of his own fortune is always an energetic man, and if we examine, we find that ninety nine out of every hundred such men have begun life without any other aid than a sound physical, moral and intellectual constitution, and have been successful in almost all the phases of life—tasting of poverty, struggling with disappointment, delegated to obscurity, and undergoing all the kicks and cuffs of "outrageous fortune," and finally, by the development of their inherent energies in such a hard, rough school, rising triumphantly all obstacles at last. Many an unwise parent labours hard and lives sparingly all his life for the purpose of leaving enough to give his children a start in the world, as it is called.
