DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Fine Effort of Minister of Finance Fielding and Sir Richard Cartwright with Reply of Mr. Borden.

OTTAWA, March 17.—Hon. W. S. Fielding, Minister of Finance, delivered the budget speech to-day. The last year, he said, has been one of great activity, in nearly all the branches of industry there has been a fair degree of prosperity. In the paramount industry of agriculture the conditions have been particularly gratifying, especially so in Manitoba and the Northwest, where an increase average and an abundant harvest gave us vast stores of grain which taxed all our facilities of transportation and warned us of the need of making fuller provisions for handling those glorious treasures of the west. The one disappointing failure is the census returns. Although disappointing we need not think them discouraging. We are all aware of the fact that during the first part of the ten year period there was not great activity in the business affairs of Canada and if we were to divide the period into two terms of five years each it would probably be found that the whole increase was during the past five years, and viewed in that light the result would be by no means discouraging.

Happily, in recent years, the prosperity of Canada has been such that statistics are not required to prove it. In the activity of trade everywhere, in the great industries which are being established, in the wide spread demand for labor, in all these things we have evidence that Canada is prospering and no doubt with the prosperity there will naturally come a large increase in the population of the country so that when we next take the census I have no doubt the results will be as gratifying as we could desire. From the financial point of view the results of the year are exceedingly satisfactory.

The finance minister went on to show that the revenue for the year was \$52,514,701, a little less than he anticipated, but considerably greater than the revenue of the previous year. He pointed out the various departments in which increase had taken place. Some of them were worthy of special notice. There was an increase of \$235,969 in the post office department. The operations of the department, however, showed a deficit of \$489,941. This was quite a large sum, but a few years ago the deficits of the department were \$500,000 and \$800,000 per annum. But in the meantime the post master general has more than cut the English postage in two, and has reduced the Canadian postage one-third. He has practically cut off what somebody described as a million dollars in the charges upon the people, and has in addition reduced an \$800,000 deficit to nearly one-half. For the eight months of the present fiscal year the sales of stamps amounted to \$3,172,935. For the same time last year they were \$2,990,028. In 1898, before the reduction of postage, the receipts for the eight months were \$2,946,513. The operations of the department for the eight months show a betterment of \$200,000.

Mr. Fielding said that the reports on railways were also worthy of special mention. After pointing out the figures for the past fiscal year he said that for the seven months of the

current year ending in January last the loss on the operations of the Intercolonial Railway was only \$89,787 compared with \$537,479 for the same time last year. This would indicate that at the close of the present fiscal year the minister of railways would have a fairly satisfactory statement as against the result of last year, which showed a deficit of \$488,000. The expenditure on consolidated fund for the year past was \$46,866,367, an increase of \$3,891,088 over the previous year. If the expenditure on capital account is included it would make a total of \$57,982,866, or an increase of \$5,265,390. About two millions and one-half of this was due to railway subsidies.

Dealing with the public debt, the finance minister said that on 30th June last it was \$268,480,003, an increase of \$2,986,196. In five years the net increase on the debt was \$9,892,570, an average of \$1,996,514, against an average for the previous 18 years of \$6,563,075. The surplus for the past year was \$5,648,335. It was very gratifying, the minister said, that the government was able to present annually these surpluses. The present government had a surplus every year except its first year in office, when there was a small deficit. The Liberals have had \$16,743,527 surpluses in five years, an average for the year of \$3,348,705. For the eighteen years the Conservatives had surpluses of \$27,862,361, and the total deficits amounted to \$18,060,648, leaving a net surplus of \$9,801,713, or an average surplus per year of \$554,539, against our surplus of more than \$3,000,000 a year.

Coming to the affairs of the current year, the revenue to the 10th March was \$38,047,685, and Mr. Fielding estimated that at the close of the year on June 30 next the amount would be in round numbers \$56,800,000, as against an actual revenue last year of \$52,514,701. With regard to the expenditure up to the 10th March it was \$39,133,502, and at the close of the year he estimated it would be in round numbers \$51,000,000. The increase in the expenditure and the increase in the revenue would about balance each other. "But," added Mr. Fielding, "as the increase of revenue is a little more than the increase of the expenditure, I think I am warranted in saying that the surplus for the current year will be a little larger than that of last year and will amount to \$5,800,000." Mr. Fielding pointed out that the capital expenditure this year was large, over \$14,000,000, but while the present government added to the public debt \$2,793,000 a year their predecessors added \$6,563,000 a year during their eighteen years in office. While the Conservatives on an average paid less than 30 per cent. of capital expenditure out of revenue the Liberals paid 71 per cent.

A feature which deserves a passing remark, said Mr. Fielding, is the gratifying increase reported by the department of the interior with regard to immigration; not only from the old country is there a moderate increase, but a new feature has been introduced in a large increase of immigration from the United States; some of these are composed of Canadians coming back, and some are a most desirable class of immigrants from the United States. From the recent announcement that the value of lands throughout the Northwest was increasing we are led to the conclusion that at last the great work of filling up the Northwest has begun in earnest. We may look forward to a splendid development during the next few years.

In regard to the duty on British and American goods, Mr. Fielding said figures from the report of the trade and commerce departments show that while the difference was slight, and not worth while debating, a mere fraction is in favor of the British goods and not in favor of the American. The tariff in 1896 made a clear discrimination of about 4 per cent. against British goods. If a comparison is made on the basis of the goods to which the preference applies it will be found that American dutiable goods paid 24 per cent., while the British goods of the same class paid 21 per cent. It was not clear to him whether the opposition regarded an increase of trade with Great Britain as favorable. It was, however, undoubtedly the case that trade with Britain was greatly increased under the preferential tariff. Mr. Fielding said: We do not propose any tariff changes this season. I do not for a moment claim that the tariff is perfect. On the whole, we claim it is a very good tariff. On the whole, when we consider the conditions under which it was made, the complicated nature of the problem we had to deal with. I think we can congratulate ourselves on framing a tariff so well devised to meet the necessities of this country. At the same time we think it is not wise to make frequent changes, and while we have made a few small alterations we have resisted applications in the past and are resisting them now. Still, after being in operation for a number of years, we may need to make revision. Conditions may
