The 7th census bulletin of Canada has been issued. There are in the dominion, under origin: English, 1,263,575; Irish, 989,858; Scotch, 798,986; French, 1,649,352; German, 798,741; Russian, 23,586; Swedish, 10,697; Polish, 6,255; Dutch, 33,839; Chinese, 17,296; Manx, 13,094; Austrian, 10,211; Belgian, 2,528; Welsh, 13,094; Finns, 2,502; Galicians, 5,682; Hungarians, 1,549; Italians, 10,892; Japanese, 4,538; Jewish, 9,123; negro, 17,427; Norwegian, 5,341; Icelandic, 9,292; Danish, 3,945; Scandinavian, 1,929; Indian, English bred, 4,557; Indian, French bred, 17,012; Indian, Irish bred, 989; Indian, Scotch bred, 6,300; Indian, other breeds, 4,706; unspecified, 32,629; Maltese, 33; Slavonic 24.

Under the head of nationalities there are: Canadians, 5,236,109; Americans, 43,398; Russian, 20,014; Austrian-Hungarian, 19,207; Chinese, 16,379; Japanese, 3,602; Swedish, 2,962; French, 3,028; Germans, 6,486; Italian, 8,180; Norwegian, 1,265; Belgian, 1,008; Turkish, 1,115; unspecified, 6,725.
