ST. JOHN LETTER.

Few residents of the city recognize the weight of their obligation to its founders for laying out and reserving the old burying ground and King square for the joint use of its people and their visitors forever. It would be extremely difficult to make St John a "pretty" city, other than architecturally. It is founded on a rock; trees will not grow in its streets; there is little room for gardens within its limits and to prepare the soil for them is expensive, but gradually King Square and the old burial ground have been improved during the last hundred years, and now with their green lawns, flower plots and trees, venerable and youthful, they are very beautiful and are the resort of hundreds of weary men and women and little children every fine day while the summer lasts.

A cargo of horses will be despatched from here on the 12th inst for Cape Colony.

Steamship Pharsalia sailed from here for South Africa with a cargo of hay.

A three legged bear was encountered on the road between here and St Martins a few days ago.

The provision and grocery markets are steady, a slight decline in flour being the only feature of the week.

About 100 Philadelphia excursionists are expected here July 15. They propose to remain in the maritime provinces about a month.

The members of the ship laborers society, on Thursday struck for 40 cents an hour. The advance was conceded, but other men will be employed as soon as present contracts are filled.

It is expected that s. s. Lake Superior will be floated next Monday or Tuesday.

Invasion of Great Britain.

For centuries the inhabitants of Great Britain have worried themselves about a possible hostile invasion of their shores. The other day, Lord Wemyss wished the House of Lords to express the opinion that "it would not be wise to trust the navy alone for security against invasion." That led the First Lord of the Admiralty to remark that the proper role of the navy is not to "perform a sentry-go up and down the coasts of these islands like a sentry at Whitehall, but to find the ships of the enemy and defeat them."

An invasion of Great Britain is so remote a contingency, the fear of it should not keep the most timid woman in the island awake five minutes. On that point the *United States Gazette* has these assuring remarks:—

"There is one consideration which is not altogether irrelevant, but which is generally left out of account by those who talk glibly of 'invasion' and that of the facilities for the transport of troops possessed by the probable invading countries. Some years ago an elaborate calculation was made by the Admiralty, and it was stated officially that to convey 100,000 men, for 48 hours, would require 129 steamships of 4,000 tons, or an aggregate of 489,000 tons. The two nations possessing the greatest armies were then taken, and having assumed for the purpose of argument and nothing more, that France was one of them, it was that in order to ship the above mentioned number of men to England, she would have to bring together every single steamship she possessed, leaving her Mediterranean coast and her various possessions abroad unprotected, and then concentrate them somewhere in the Channel. When she had got them there, it was remarked that there would be no port where she could locate them, or find sufficient wharfage for them. The difficulties to-day, we believe, are, in all essential particulars, the same as when this statement was made by the then First Lord of the Admiralty little more than ten years ago."

"Our own experiences in the South Africa war, moreover, have afforded conclusive evidence of the immense difficulties in the way of the speedy embarkation of troops. Possessing resources absolutely unrivalled, and the greater part of the mercantile marine of the world, it took six months to embark about the number of men which Lord Wemyss no doubt considers may easily drop in upon us with scarcely two or three hours' notice."
