Report of Superintendent Water Works, 1901.

To His Worship, the Mayor, an Council of the Town of Woodstoe GENTLEMEN :- I beg leave to su mit the following Annual Report the Water Works Department of the

MACHINERY. The engineer reports that t Compound Pumping Engines at Pumps, the Single Pumping Engin and the Boilers are all in good wor ing order.

During last year the Compoun Pumping Engines were overhaule and put in first class order, the Cylinders being re-bored, and new pistons fitted to each Cylinder, and also New Slide Valves, and these Source of supply-River St John. engines are now working in a much more satisfactory manner than previously, and require less fuel to run them. The Air Pump in connection with these engines does not work as well as we would like, and some change will require to be made in this, in order to have the advantage of the condensing apparatus to the full extent.

The foundation walls of the Pump- | Meters in use-74. ing Station received some needed repairs and have all been pointed up with cement to protect same.

MAINS, GATES AND HYDRANTS. The Water Mains, Stop Gates and

Fire Hydrants are all in good order. During the past year we had quite a number of leaks on the Mains, all caused by the lead joint being blown out. A number of the Hydrants had to have the main valve renewed, and a number of the Stop Gates had to be repacked.

We have 90 of these Stop Gates in the Mains, with a gate box set over 1. Estimated total population at date-3003. them, 5 inches in diameter, to put 2 the wrench down through.

require to be repacked around the spindle from time to time, and to do this have to be dug up, and this adds to the expense. All these Stop Gates should have a brick man-hole with iron cover, so that a man could get down to them to make repairs without any digging, as in many eases it is very important to have these gates so that they can be got at quickly. I would recommend that the most important gates be provided with these man holes this coming season and the others attended to each year until all are completed.

The Standpipe was emptied and cleaned out in June and October this year, and the Crib Well was cleaned out in October.

The ice freshet in the Meduxnekeag this last spring damaged the iron front on the north pier of the Water Main Bridge, and this will require to be repaired this spring

The erection and completion late this fall of the dwelling for the engineer at a cost in all, including grading lot, &c, of about \$1,600.00, supplying a convenient and comfortable home for the engineer adjoining the Pumping Station, will be of advantage to the town, and is very much appreciated by the engineer.

The Annexed Statement shows in detail the Expenditures in connection with the works, and furnish information in regard to the System, also the earnings and amount received for water rates, and the accompanying statements show in detail payments for water rates, and also amount unpaid for same.
