SOME CENSUS FIGURES.

Census Bulletin No 3 contains an abstract of the population of the provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Quebec, by census districts, classed as rural and urban, and compared with the census of 1891.

In New Brunswick the rural population was 253,835, as against 272,362 in 1891, and the urban population was 77,285, compared with 49,901. The total population of the province was 331,212, as against 321,263 in 1891.

In Nova Scotia the total population of the province was 459,574, as against 450,386 in 1891. The rural population was 330,191, compared with 373,403 in 1891. The urban population was 129,383, as compared with 76,993 in 1891.

In P. E. Island the population was 103,250, compared with 103,078 in 1891. The rural population was 88,304, as against 94,823, and the urban was 14,955, as against 14,255.

MOST NORTHERN RAILWAY.

Miners back from Nome, which is now a city of 6,000 or 7,000 inhabitants, give interesting accounts of the Wild Goose railway, the most northern line in the world, one of the shortest, and probably for its length the most profitable.

The Wild Goose road was built by C. D. Lane. It runs from Nome five miles back into the country to Anvil City, and its running time is about an hour for the distance.

It has a narrow gauge, one engine, one box car and several flat cars. It runs only in summer, but last year its net profit was \$280,000.

The passengers ride on benches in the one box car and pay \$1 for the five-mile journey. The freight rate is \$40 a ton, the same rate that is paid for carrying freight from Seattle 3,600 miles to Nome.

The road is not graded and its ties are laid on the frozen tundra, and when that thaws in summer the ties and the tracks with them sink into the mud. The engine consequently runs through black lakes, whose waters splash furiously and threaten the engine fires.

There are several gullies on the line and the train rushes down one side with a speed that generally carries it up the other. If it doesn't reach the top it backs off and bucks at it until it succeeds.

The road doesn't possess a turntable, so the trip from Anvil City back to Nome is made backward, and in order that the engineer may see tracks there is a window at each end of the passenger box car. Through these windows, also, the passengers get their only view, and the blocking of them by passengers, heads is the cause of many objections on the part of the engineer.

Collisions, of course, are unknown on the Wild Goose railway, but it is by no means an uncommon incident for engine and train to be tipped over on the tundra. They are so light that they are easily jacked back again. There is one drawbridge across Snake river.—New York Sun

To Alter Act of Confederation.

Montreal, Feb. 25.—Probably the most important matter that will be considered at the present session of the Quebec Legislature has been introduced by a resolution which has been placed on the order paper and is expected to be discussed during the coming week. If the resolution is carried, the Government of Great Britain will be asked to alter the Act it sanctioned in 1867, establishing the Canadian Confederation.

The principal object sought by the modifications asked for is to change the basis on which the Federal subsidy to the province is calculated. Each province receives an annual subsidy from the Federal Government. The subsidy to the Province of Quebec is based on its population of 1861, which the census taken that year showed to be 1,110,664. The rate paid by the Dominion Government is 80 cents per capita. For

many years the subsidy paid to the Province of Quebec upon this basis has been considered insufficient. Since 1861 the population of Quebec has increased considerably, but the subsidy paid into the provincial treasury by the Dominion Government is the same as in 1861.

Were the present population of the province taken as a basis of computation, the subsidy, which amounts to about \$950,000 would be increased by some \$450,000 per year. The late Mr. Mercier made a big effort to have the subsidy changed, but without avail.

The resolution, which is introduced by Mr. Perrault, one of the Montreal members, is as follows:—

That, in the opinion of this House, the revenues of the provinces, granted by the British North American Act, are insufficient to allow them to meet the requirements of the same time to give the necessary assistance to colonization, the development of industries, and to the improvement of education. That the interpretation given to various clauses of our constitution has endangered the existence of our local institutions. That the Government of the Dominion of Canada, and those of the other provinces, should be invited to join the Government of the Province of Quebec in asking the Parliament of the United Kingdom to modify the Confederation Act so as to change the basis on which the Federal subsidy is calculated, to assure to the provinces the exclusive control over their public properties and the railways within their limits, and to permit them to impose exportation duties on the outputs of their forest and mines, and to confer upon the Government of Great Britain the right of disallowance of provincial laws at present exercised by the Government of Canada.

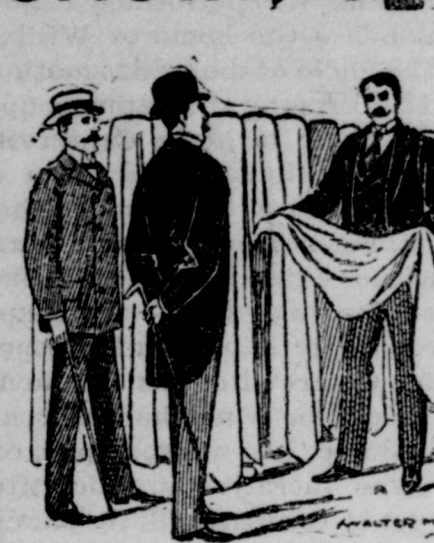

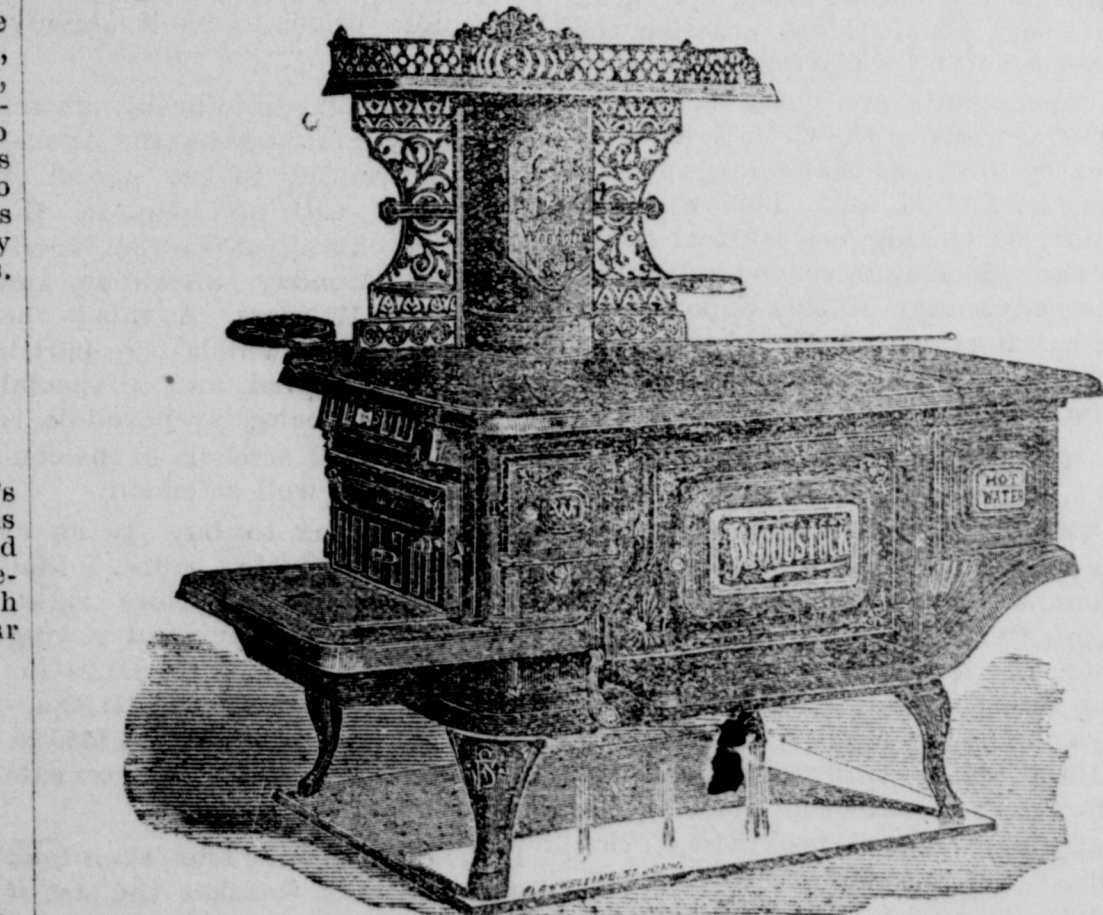
