"It is glaringly apparent that the arrangements made by the War Office for the Canadian contingent entirely disregarded the convenience suite of 140 persons and 120 tons of of the officers and men. In the first place the location of the camp at Alexandra Palace was unwise. When the contingent arrived from Liverpool officers and men were divided. It required a united protest from the Canadian officers to secure the cancellation of the order separating them from their men. The Duke of Connaught, in inspecting the Canadians, expressed surprise that the men should march past in fatigue dress. He was informed that the new uniforms were in the tents.
