CANADIAN NATIONALITY

To-day Canada is the leading nation in the empire, outside the British Isles; and in no part of the world is the British tradition being more securely perpetuated than on this northern half of this continent, by means of devotion to the idea of a Canadian nationality working in and through our British representative institutions. The Canadian people are thus building up a great nation, and are thereby best conducting to making the British Empire, in Sir Wilfrid Laurier's words: "a galaxy of self-governing nations under one sovereign."—Winnipeg Free Press.

ANDRE KILLED.

Winnipeg, July 7.—Rev. Dr. Farlies, a Church of England clergyman, arrived from York Factory, North-west British Territory yesterday, and brings authentic information of the fate of Explorer Andre and his companions.

Two years ago, 90 miles north of York, a party of Eskimos under the leadership of "Old Huskie," saw the Andre balloon alight on a plain of snow in that vicinity, which is about two miles north of Fort Churchill. Three men emerged from the balloon and some of "Huskie's" people approached them out of curiosity.

As they did so one of Andre's companions fired off a gun. This is a signal to uncivilized natives for battle. It is regarded as a challenge, and almost instantly the natives fell upon the three explorers and massacred them. Everything pertaining to their outfit was carried away to the homes of the natives on the north borders of the Arctic region.

"Old Huskie" himself gave this information to Ralph Alstine, agent for the Hudson Bay Company, and the story, after being investigated by Dr. Farlies, was told by him today. He says there is little room for doubt, as frequent reports have since come of the strange implements which the north natives have in their possession, the telescope being particularly described.

The Hudson Bay Company has recently offered a reward for the recovery of any portion of the outfit belonging to Andre, and though natives have gone on the search for them they have never returned, believing, as Rev. Dr. Farlies says, that they will in some way be punished, for they now understand that it was not an attack upon them, but an accident by which the gun was discharged that precipitated the massacre.

Had Andre made friends with the natives, it is held that he would have been safely conducted south, and would eventually have reached civilization. The Hudson Bay Company has recently sent another party in search of the balloon and outfit of Andre, and hopes to have conclusive evidence of the fate of the explorers within a few months.

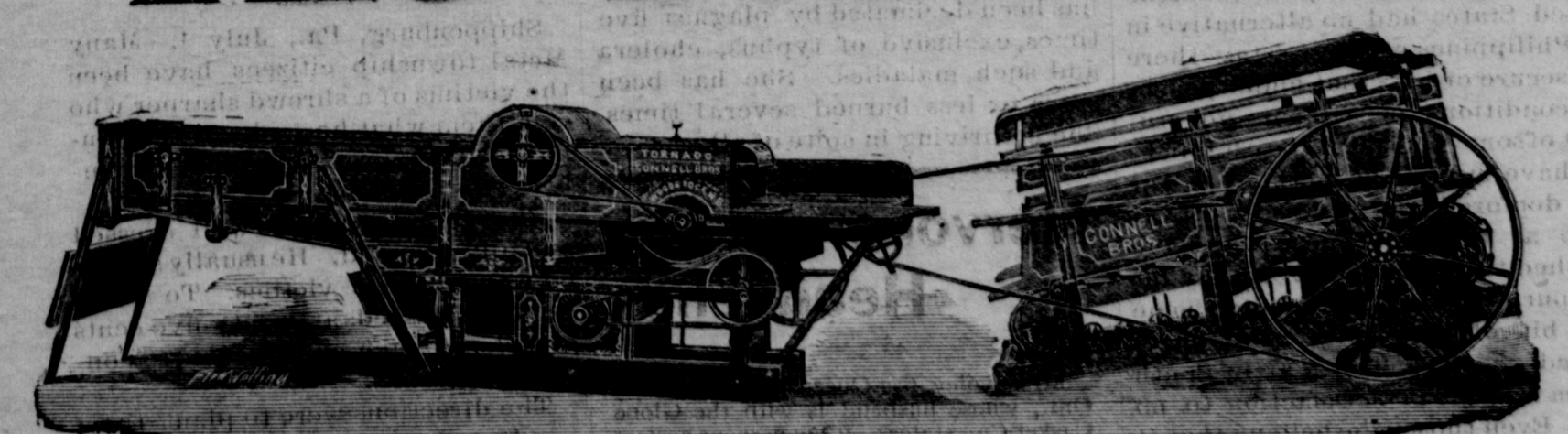
