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SERIOUS ACCIDENT.

Dr E S Kirkpatrick met with a serious accident, Saturday night last, which came dangerously near being a fatal one. He in company with E L Clark, Joseph Fewer, Robt Hughes and C D Johnson, was on a hunting expedition at Cronk Lake, some four miles from Allandale. They occupied an oiled canvas tent, and on Saturday night, when soundly sleeping, from some cause, the tent caught fire. The men awaking, confusedly, tried to extinguish the flames, but finally had to make a hurried exit through the door. Dr Kirkpatrick did not escape with the others, but struggled to get out by raising the rear of the tent, in which attempt he became so surrounded by the fierce flames that he had to give it up, and make a bold rush for the door; he succeeded in getting out of the burning furnace, but at the expense of severe burns on hands and face. A guide was sent out to the settlement and procured a man and horse, and the doctor was conveyed to the village on horseback, suffering great agony, having to be held on the horse by the man who was leading the animal. The doctor reached home Sunday night and was at once given medical aid. His burns will confine him to the house for some weeks, and in the meantime, his brother, Dr C S Kirkpatrick, will attend to the office practise.

A Successful Hunting Trip.

George H Saunders and Humboldt Sharp, of this town, accompanied by Dr J W Hayward of St Boniface Hospital, Boston; Dr C W Copeland, Whitman, Mass, and W C Davenport, president of the First National Bank, of Taunton, Mass, have just returned from a very pleasant and successful hunting trip on the Miramichi Lake. Each one of the Americans succeeded in landing large game. Dr Hayward shot a bull moose that had a spread of antlers of 59 inches, with 14 tips on one horn and 13 on the other; Dr Copeland shot a spike horn moose and a very large deer; Mr Davenport wounded a very fine bull moose and had to go home without it, but fortunately it was afterwards found by one of the guides and the head will be sent him, at which doubtless he will be well pleased, as this was the first time in his life he had the privilege of firing at a bull moose. Charles McEwen, Turney Gray, Harvey Biggar, did the polling of the boat; Jas Gough, of this town, did the cooking and did it well; Geo H Saunders, Humboldt Sharp and Charles McEwen did the moose calling. The visitors were well satisfied with their trip and expect to return on the opening of the season next year.

General Booth.

General William Booth who is visiting St. John next week, the founder and commander-in-chief of the Salvation Army, was born in Nottingham, England, in 1829, brought up Church of England, converted under the Wesleyans in 1844, became a minister of the Methodist New Connection. Resigned from the ministry in 1861 and in 1865 organized what is now the Salvation Army. Hot persecution was the order of the day for many years. Ignorance of the object and workings of the army may be given as the chief reason for most of the opposition. Wading through all these misunderstandings etc. it has spread into every country on the face of the earth bringing light and liberty to many of the poorest and weakest of earth's downtrodden inhabitants. Considering the short time this organization has been at work the following statistics will show how quickly and with what power this movement for the good of the masses has spread; it now operates in 47 countries and colonies, has a fighting force of 15,583, Officers, Local Officers, who support themselves, 26,224, Corps and Outposts operated 7,383, monthly and weekly periodicals number 54, printed in 21 different languages with a circulation of 1,000,000 copies weekly. Social Institutions such as Rescue Homes and Men's Shelter etc, number 556, assisting daily 20,000 poor people. Figures are cold things, but the warmth of the workers, and results will all be seen by and by when He who does not forget the "cup of cold water" numbers up the faithful. Quite a large number of citizens are going to avail themselves of the privilege of hearing and seeing, likely for the last time in Canada, this mighty man whose efforts have been so rewarded, and blessed. She had many friends and all deeply regret her death, so young in life. She had only completed her thirty second year. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. J. S. Gregg of Andover.

AUTUMN CARNIVAL.

The Autumn Carnival at St. John, N. B., from the 8th to the 14th. October offers a most attractive week of sport, which with the cheap fares announced should draw a large number of people to that City.

On Wednesday 8th, there will be Yacht Races on the Harbour. The boats will sail from Reed's Point to a buoy off Red Head, and thence to the whistling buoy off Partridge Island, and back to starting point. Six Yachts have already entered; and the competition is open to all yachts of the Cabin Class. A first prize of \$40, a second prize of \$30, third of \$20, and fourth of \$10 are offered.

On Thursday and Friday there will be three splendid trotting events at Moosepark Park. On Saturday there will be a Base Ball match between the Champions of Montreal and a picked St. John team, on the athletic grounds, followed at 2.30 by a Regatta on the Harbour in which there will be four oared, and double and single scull contests. The names of the crew will be announced later.

For evening entertainment there will be ample provision. Among the attractions will be afternoon and evening performances by the Salem Cadet Band, which is acknowledged to be the best Band today in all the New England States.
