General News Items.

Presbyterianism is gaining a stronghold in Salt Lake City. Denmark has 1,032 co-operative dairies, which yield \$35,000,000 worth of milk a year.

With the exception of the potato crop the Irish harvest has been the best for many years.

Of Italy's town population, above the age of fifteen, no fewer than 1,132,257 are illiterate.

The Catholics of New York city, are planning to erect a temple that will seat 70,000 people.

Every boy in Germany, from the Crown Prince to the meanest subject is obliged to learn some useful trade.

The provincial legislature which stood prorogued to 19th of November has been further prorogued to 8th of January.

A new religious sect has appeared at Borga, Finland. One of its peculiarities is the use of bread and coffee in the communion service.

The Connecticut apple crop is so large that farmers are at loss to know what to do with their fruit, and thousands of bushels of the finest kind are rotting on the ground.

The bulk of British preserves is made in London. A reliable estimate gives the weekly output by London makers as 500 to 600 tons and this output is annually increasing.

FLOUR MADE OF FISH.

Fish flour is the name of a new variety of prepared food that the ingenious Norwegians are making and shipping abroad in large quantities. The centre of the industry is Bergen, the old headquarters of the codfish and cod liver oil trade. A foreign consul at that point in a recent letter says:—

A great deal is done in Norway to improve and preserve the provisions produced in that country and to procure a market for them abroad. The fisheries represent one of Norway's chief industries, and quantities of fish are sold at very low rates, particularly during the summer. One way in which these are utilized is by means of an invention which quickly dries and pulverizes the flesh of fresh fish. The resulting product, called fish flour, is easy to transport from one place to another and has great nutritive value.
