General News Items.

Thirty years ago the population of Southern California was but 30,000; to-day it has 450,000.

A seat on the Montreal Exchange was purchased Friday morning by W. R. Miller for \$23,500, the highest ever paid here.

It is asserted at Brussels that Kruger has abandoned his irreconcilable attitude, and intends to seek permission to return to South Africa.

During the month of October, fifteen prisoners have been sent to Dorchester Penitentiary from Nova Scotia—the shortest sentence being for two years and the longest for life.

ENFORCEMENT OF LAW.

The Hamilton Spectator severely criticises the work of the License Commissioners of that city, which it claims is far from satisfactory in several respects. Similar complaints are common throughout the country.

Does it occur to those who find many flaws in the administration of the present license system, and in some instances declare that the law is scarcely regarded at all, that the easiest solution of the problem lies in total prohibition?

Ever since Horace Greeley made the statement nearly half a century ago, it has been agreed by all who have given close attention to the matter, that the enforcement of a prohibitory law is beset with fewer obstacles than the enforcement of any kind of license law.

So long as the sale of liquor is allowed at all, it is extremely difficult to prevent the holder of a wine and beer license, where such discrimination is made, from selling stronger drinks, or the holder of a license for selling within certain hours from selling in forbidden hours.

In the license States of the American Union the enforcement of the liquor laws is uncertain, variable, and easily turned into a farce. In prohibitory States like Maine, Kansas, and the Dakotas, the law can be, and has been, made a comparatively complete success with much less effort.

THE ALLIANCE PLAN.

The Ontario Branch of the Dominion Alliance is specially fitted for the work of planning and supervising the Referendum campaign. The convention on the 29th will contain representatives of the bodies whose members must do the actual work in the contest. That contest will be a struggle between the churches and temperance societies on the one hand and the liquor traffic on the other. There is no other agency through which all churches and temperance societies can federate and co-operate except the Ontario Branch of the Dominion Alliance.

The work done by the Alliance in the plebiscite campaign in 1895 was so thorough and complete that there has been practically no criticism of it. One of its features was literature circulation upon an enormous scale. No fewer than 8,800,000 documents were issued, all of which material was supplied to workers at less than cost, the Executive Committee raising funds in other ways to make up the difference. A similar work will be necessary in the Referendum fight.

Plans must also be laid for a comprehensive platform and pulp campaign. There must be a department of skillfully directed organization, work providing methods and forms and supervising work, relating to canvassing and polling details. The whole campaign will need wise direction and upon the convention will fall the responsibility of selecting the Executive Committee to which this important duty will be committed.

WHERE DO SALMON FEED.

(Success.)

There is no family of fish more interesting than the salmon, and in no other fishery have the benefits of artificial propagation been more clearly demonstrated. The homing instinct of the salmon enabled the propagators of fry to learn at the beginning of their work, that it was worth doing. Salmon hatched in any stream usually return to that stream when they are of spawning age. The propagators reared salmon to the size of fingerlings, marked them and turned them loose. In due time the marked fish returned and were caught in the homestream. It is a curious fact however that in spite of the homing instinct, salmon are found at the spawning season in the brackish water at the foot of Alaska glaciers where it is believed no fish was ever hatched. Another curious fact, learned through marking the artificially propagated fish, is that a fingerling weighing from one to two ounces may grow to weigh from two to ten pounds in six or eight months and in two years a weight of forty pounds has been reached. The growth depends of course, on the food supply. But where salmon feed and what they feed on have not yet been learned. It is supposed that they find small marine animals so numerous in the deep sea haunts that they swim about as in a soup. Perhaps the deep sea haunts will some time be discovered.

Mr. Mullin has been granted the privilege to appeal for a new trial of murderer Higgins. It is thought here that an appeal will be of no effect.

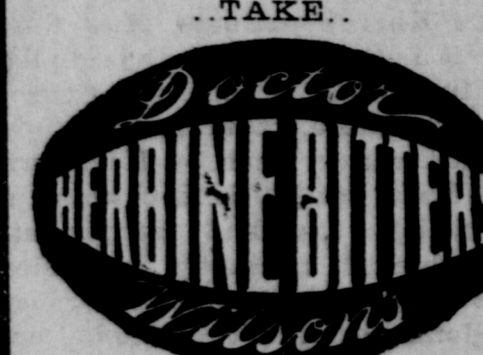
