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THE rumor is current that the Local Legislature will be prorogued April 9th.

MR. THOMAS H. COLTER, brother of Dr. N. R. Colter, P. O. Inspector, has been appointed registrar of deeds for York county, in place of the late Mr. Abraham D. Yerxa.

THE Nova Scotia Legislature was prorogued on the 27th ult. The session was an important one, and a larger number of bills was considered than ever before in the history of the province.

THE pastor of a Baptist church in Binghamton, N. Y., recently died, and the congregation have officially invited his widow, a very clever woman, to become regularly ordained and assume the pastorate of the church.

SOME of the Opposition press are gloating over the fact that Mr. Loy's majority over Mr. Bergeron in the Beauharnois by-election last week was 121 less than in the last election. This is easily accounted for from the fact that there were 250 more names on the Valleyfield list in 1900.

THE Toronto Mail and Empire celebrated its thirtieth anniversary by the issue of a special number on the 29th March; it is a very handsomely printed and attractively filled, a large number of its pages being taken up with a description of the various departments of its great business, fully illustrated.

THE old and popular hardware firm of Almon H. Fogg & Co., have organized a corporation under the name of Almon H. Fogg company, having added to the old firm, G. Edward Wilkins and Charles H. Fogg. Doubtless the new corporation will continue to maintain the popular character of the old house.

MR. HAZEN introduced his resolution favoring certain reforms, in the local house, on Wednesday. It was ruled out of order, because it involved the expenditure of money and the abolition of Solicitor General, thus interfering with the prerogative of the crown. Supply was made the order of the day for Thursday.

Fire Limit.

Our Town Council should proceed with caution in acting upon the report of the committee favoring the establishment of a fire limit. It is very doubtful if it would prove beneficial to the town should the measure carry. At all events, the area to be embraced, as recommended by the committee, is altogether too large to experiment with. We are of the opinion that, in a town of the population of Woodstock, with its admirable fire protection, the uncertainty of a home market from which to procure brick and many other causes which naturally present themselves, it would not be wise to establish a fire limit; but in case such a course should be decided upon by all means try the experiment on a much more circumscribed area than than that proposed.

DEATH OF CECIL RHODES.

This great man has passed away, but the effects produced by his life and acts will long live on the page of English history. His death took place at Cape Town, on the 26th March, the immediate cause being heart failure. A London Despatch says: The estimates of the career of Cecil Rhodes and its effect on the history of the British Empire are largely colored by the political views of the papers making them. But the opinion is unanimous in the press here that in spite of the defects and the limitations of his forceful character, few men have more profoundly impressed the imagination of their contemporaries or played a larger part in the world's affairs than Cecil Rhodes, and that the empire is poorer by his premature death.

With the expressions of admiration of his great services are mingled kindly worded regrets for the disastrous mistake made in the Jameson raid.

The ice jams in the entire river are so far broken as to leave no fear for further damage from them. The weather during the week has been cold with considerable rain. We should judge the rain has been favorable for the lumbermen. OBITUARIES.

GEORGE H. CLARK.

George H. Clark, aged 24 years, a promising young man and a general favorite, died very suddenly at 7.30, Tuesday evening. He had been unwell since Christmas but was able to continue his usual work, until a few days ago, and he intended to resume work on Wednesday as apparently he was getting better. On the afternoon of his death, he was about the street. The deceased was a native of Newcastle, Northumberland county, and came here two years ago since which time he was employed at the Woodstock Woodworking Factory, and made his home with one of the firm, James Astle. He was on his way to visit friends, Mr. and Mrs. Oliver, and when about to enter the house he became unconscious and died four hours afterwards.

At 9.00 Wednesday evening, Rev. J. C. Berrie conducted services over the remains, and on Thursday morning the body was taken to Newcastle for interment accompanied by James Astle. Mrs. Clark, his mother, arrived in Woodstock Wednesday evening.

Among the tributes of respect was a beautiful wreath from the managers and employees of the Company for which he worked.

MISS BELL GILLIN.

The many friends of Miss Bell Gillin, Hartland, will regret to hear of her death which took place at her home on Tuesday morning, and general sympathy will be extended to the family in its bereavement.

WILLIAM SHERWOOD.

On Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock the death of William Sherwood occurred at Jacksonville. The deceased, who was 52 years of age, was a prominent member of both the Odd Fellows and Foresters, and his death will be deeply regretted by the community. Francis Kelly, representing J. Vanwart, will act as funeral director, and the remains will be interred at Waterville today (Friday).
