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THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS.

The Ontario provincial elections last week proved a sharply fought and closely contested political battle. There was a bitter contest in every constituency but one, and in many instances the majorities were small. The exact majority of the Liberals is as yet uncertain, but the standing of the two parties at the close of the elections, appeared to be Liberals, 51; Conservatives, 47, which give the Liberals a majority of four. Since that estimate, however, one Liberal elect, Munro, of North Renfrew, has died which reduces that majority to 3. At the close of the election in 1893, the Liberal Government had a majority of 3, but that number was afterwards increased by recounts and bye-elections. When the late legislature was dissolved the government majority was eight.

10th. Mr. Ross has expressed himself as well satisfied with the present result, and, considering all the circumstances, he may well afford to be. It is something unusual for any one political party, after a reign of thirty-four consecutive years, to receive at the hands of the electors so hearty approval of their acts and rule, as to be returned by a majority as great as received at the previous election; a striking evidence of the wisdom and purity which has marked the administration of the Liberal Government. Mr. Ross may well feel gratified at his increased majority and at the return of every member of his cabinet.

CLERK'S MEETING.

Acting on the suggestion of the Board of Trade the clerks of the Town held a meeting on Wednesday evening to consider the question of celebrating Coronation Day. Ed Clark was chosen chairman and E. W. Mair, Secretary; Chas. Appleby representing the Board of Trade, was present. While the feeling was strongly in favor of a celebration, the young men fully realized that the success of such an undertaking was entirely dependent upon the action of the business men. After some discussion a committee was appointed to act in unison with the committee of the Board of Trade to wait upon the merchants and learn their views; that committee comprises E. Clark, S. Carr, R. Waddleton, Loggie Ross, and Robt. Parkins; this committee will report at a meeting to be called by the chair. Mr. Appleby was requested to bring the matter to the attention of the Town Council and solicit their aid. As the help of the clerks is absolutely necessary to the successful carrying out of a creditable celebration, the matter depends now on whether the business men will close their stores, on that day. We hope they may see their way to adopt that course.

OBITUARY.

MICHAEL KELLY.

Michael Kelly, the well known contractor and mason, who had a large circle of friends in town and county, died on Monday afternoon after several weeks illness from heart trouble. He was born in Ireland 74 years and ten months ago, came to this town when a young man and has since made his home here. He leaves a widow and three sons, Frank and Owen of Woodstock, and Ambrose, of Boston, the latter having been called home some weeks ago when it was noticed his father was dangerously ill. The funeral left his late residence at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning and proceeded to St. Gertrude's church where a mass of requiem was celebrated by Rev. Father Chapman; the interment was made in the Catholic cemetery; the pall bearers were Peter Ryan, John McCormac, Kames Brophy and John Coggers. The sympathy of the community is given to the family in its bereavement.

What is claimed to have been the sharpest and best game of ball ever played in Woodstock, took place on the school grounds, Saturday, between the Grammar school and Independents, the latter a team selected from the best players in town, and the victory, as usual, was with the Grammarians, the score being 6-5. The G. S. had for a battery Don Connell and Roy McLauchlan, while Billy Courtney and Tine Walker officiated for the Independents; N. F. Thorne acted as umpire. The game started with the G. S. in the field, and the first three batters were put out in a sensational manner by the fielders, but the G. S., when they went to bat were served in the same manner; this continued for three innings, when Connell, of the G. S., crossed the plate; in the fourth innings, neither side scored; in the fifth, the G. S. got two more scores; in the next three innings, the Independents got 5, and the G. S., 2, making a tie score, 5 each. The last innings opened with great excitement: one Independent reached 3d base, but his side died. Two men got out in the last half, before the G. S. rushed its man across the plate with the winning run.

WOODSTOCK—FREDERICKTON

This (Friday) afternoon, a most interesting game will be played in the park. The contending teams will be the Fredericton High School and the Woodstock Grammar School. There is very keen rivalry between the two teams, as the winners will be the intercollegiate champions of the province. In order to partially meet expenses of the visiting team, 15c will be the admission fee for adults and 10c for children. A buckboard will convey passengers to and from the park at the usual low rates. Milmore and Connell will be battery for the home team and Kinghorn and Dunphy will officiate for the visitors.

SMALLPOX AGAIN.

On Monday, Charles Atherton, son of R. N. Atherton, janitor of Broadway school, and Mrs. Stairs a neighbor, showed symptoms of smallpox. Neither of the sufferers had been vaccinated; the first named, it is said absolutely refused to be. Guards have been put on both houses and the Broadway school has been closed until after the summer vacation.

When, recently, the Board made vaccination compulsory, a number of citizens refused to recognize their legal obligation and thus jeopardized their own and the health of the community and one of these is now suffering the consequence of his own act. So far as those referred to are concerned, not much sympathy will be felt for them should they become victims of the disease.

The chairman of the Board of Health has tendered his resignation to the government and all the members have handed in their resignation. The strong feeling expressed in regret at this action of the Board, and the hope is indulged that they will continue their efficient services, for which "Kicks not coppers" have been given them, at any rate for the present.
