She Took Her Papa Home.

The following story of a pathetic incident which occurred in Atlanta, Ga., is told by the *Southern Star*, a prohibition paper of that city. It is not an unusual incident at all, its counterpart has been witnessed in every large city where the open saloon tempts weak men to their ruin: It was nine o'clock at night, bitterly cold, and the winds whistled around the police barracks in Atlanta. Hardly a person was on the street it was so bleak and cold.

The officers at the barracks had gathered around the warm heater telling their experiences in the past, when a little, gentle rap was heard on the door.

'Come in,' cried the call officer. There was a silence for a moment and the rap was repeated again.

'For goodness sake tell whoever it is to come in out of the cold,' called the station sergeant. Then an effort was made to open the door, but it failed, and then for the third time the tap on the door was repeated and the call man jumped up and opened the door.

Out in the cold, on the stone steps stood a tiny little girl. She was thinly clad, although it was freezing outside. Her thin brown hair hung in damp shreds about her pale forehead.

'Come in, little girl, and get warm,' exclaimed the officer.

The child shuddered either from fright or cold and slowly walked into the office.

'What do you want,' asked the astonished sergeant.

'Is—papa here?' said the child, her eyes filling with tears.

'Your papa,' said the sergeant, 'who is your papa, and why do you think he is in such a place?'

Brushing away the tears the child replied in a trembling voice: 'Mamma said to-night that papa was sick and the police had him. So I came here to find him. Is he here?'

The little one then gave the name of her father and the sergeant found that he was docketed as being drunk. He called the turnkey and asked him to see if the man had sobered up.

The turnkey reported that the man was sober enough to go home.

'Then let him out,' said the kind-hearted officer, 'and give him a copy of charges. It's not business, but the little girl shall have her papa.'

The man came out haggard and weak from the effects of his spree.

The child ran with a glad cry into his arms and kissed him again and again.

'Mamma told me you were sick,' she said, 'and I have come to take you home.'

The man made no reply. His hands trembled as he tried to smooth back her brown hair. In silence he passed from the barracks with his trusting, loving little girl.

'If that man doesn't reform and let this be his last drunk,' remarked the station sergeant, 'he is made of stone.'

This is only one of thousands of sad cases that are chronicled by our daily press each year. We think that voters have hearts of stone when they allow such things to exist. Let us as loyal Christian citizens awake and say by our ballots that the saloons will go from Atlanta, the State of Georgia and the nation and then there will be no more debauchery, crime or misery caused by the hellish traffic which should be forever outlawed, and which is every year ruining hundreds of thousands of homes and sending thousands to drunkards graves.

Goldwin Smith, a man of rare brilliancy but of the scantiest medium of discretion, was one of a deputation that waited on the Ontario Government in opposition to prohibitory legislation. Among other wise recommendations he urged that the use of light wines should be encouraged. This suggestion has often been made, and if men would be content with "light wines" there would be no drunkenness. But the old-time drunkards graduated on light wines and learnt to seek greedily for strong drink.—France, too, has of late years become devoted to the strongest and most objectionable alcoholic drinks. Doubtless the wisest course is to make it as difficult as possible for young persons to form the deadly passion for strong drink.

The liquor business is not any better to-day than it was ten years ago. It is worse. It has slain its thousands in these years. Like epidemic diseases it spreads, and finds its victims in many directions, sometimes where we would least expect.

General News Items.

Sydney is to spend \$75,000 on street improvements this year.

It costs £2,000 a year to ventilate the House of Commons.

One factory in England is turning out 4,320,000 ping-pong balls each week.

The blood-stained vest of Charles I. was sold in London on the 11th ult. for 200 guineas.

Right Hon. James Lowther presented petitions in the British House of Commons from Liverpool and Cardiff, containing 35,000 signatures, praying for duties on foreign goods.

Le Journal says that the English vote in Beauharnois went solid for Loy, the Liberal candidate. For thirty years, it says, the English vote has gone Conservative. The Liberals appear to have a majority of all kinds of votes.

The Pope's income is \$1,400,000, one-seventh of which is guaranteed by the Emperor of Austria; another seventh comes from vested interests and the remainder is derived from Peter's Pence.

England is only second in Europe in point of fast trains. Whereas her fastest trains are put down as travelling close on fifty-five miles per hour, France shows upwards of fifty-eight miles. German trains come next with about fifty-one miles, and Belgium fourth with forty-nine.

The odor from burning leather is considered a protection against infectious disease. During the prevalence of cholera in Vienna, years ago, no shoemaker was attacked. They prevented it by burning scraps of leather in their houses.

SOUTH AFRICA.

London, April 4.—There was severe fighting all day long on March 31, in the neighborhood of Hart's River, in the southwestern extremity of the Transvaal, between part of Gen. Kitchener's force and the forces of Generals Delarey and Kemp, resulting in the repulse of the Boers after heavy losses on both sides. The Canadian Rifles especially distinguished themselves, one party, commanded by Lieut. Bruce Carruthers, holding its post till every man was killed or wounded.

Lord Kitchener's official report, dated from Pretoria, yesterday evening, says:—General Kitchener (Lord Kitchener's brother) sent Colonels Keir and Cookson from Vreikuil, Western Transvaal, March 31, to go towards Hart's River. They soon struck the track of guns and carried on a running fight for eight miles, following the track through the bush. Emerging on a plain, large Boer reinforcements advanced against their flanks, forcing the British troops to take up a defensive position, which they hastily entrenched. Fighting ensued at close quarters until the Boers were repulsed on all sides.

Delarey, Kemp and other leaders vainly attempted to persuade their men to renew their attack. Fifteen hundred Boers participated in the engagement, but they had suffered too heavily and cleared away to the northwest and south. The British losses were also severe. Others of the forces showed great steadiness, allowing the Boers to advance within two hundred yards of them and repelling them with a steady rifle fire.

"No Serpent Tempted Eve."

A Kansas minister, Rev. Mr. Lowther Macpherson, in explaining his opinion of the temptation of Eve, which opinion prompted the filing of charges against him, said:—

CROWN LAND REPORT.

The annual report of the Crown Land Department for the year ending October 31st, 1901, shows receipts \$200,319.98, an increase of \$24,501.59 over the previous year. This increase was wholly in sales of timber licenses which yielded \$34,553.62 against \$2,950.90 the previous year, and mining leases which give \$5,677.50 against \$2,576.88. The receipts from stumpage decreased from \$12,315.59 to \$101,162.48, while land sales show a decrease from \$2,866.85 to \$2,317.50. The amount of spruce and pine lumber that paid stumpage was 83,440,123 superficial feet, and cedar logs, 11,187,791 superficial feet. 94,719 railway ties also paid stumpage at two cents apiece. The amount paid for scaling, collection and protection of lumber was \$8,585.45. The land grants issued in the year were 205 in number, embracing 17,735 acres. As to mining, 12 prospecting licenses, 86 licenses to search and 10 licenses to work, and 10 leases were issued. Referring to immigration, Mr. Dunn says 800 immigrants arrived last spring and they were distributed throughout the province.
