# EDWARD YARDIE.

Mr Edward Yardie, the veteran printer, so well and favorably known throughout the province, died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs W H Everett, in this town, Sunday afternoon, aged 89 years and 8 months. The remains were taken to Fredericton, Monday, for interment. Mr Yardie was born in Fredericton in December, 1812, and was foreman of the Royal Gazette in that city for 50 years. Subsequently he removed to Roxbury, Mass., where he was presented by the city council with the freedom of the city for his gift to the public library there of valuable ancient manuscripts. After the death of his daughter, Mrs Kearney, he removed to Woodstock, a year ago, and resided with his daughter Mrs Everett, until his death. Three of his daughters, Mrs Welch, Mrs Vail and Mrs Butterfield, reside in Boston, and Mrs W H Everett in this town. He was a gentleman who made many friends wherever he was known.
