What Percentage of Young Men Go to Church.

An investigation into the attitude of young men toward religion and the Church was recently undertaken by secretaries of the Young Men's Christian Association in co-operation with the Federal Census Bureau. Representatives of cities, towns, and country districts were selected in different parts of the United States and in individual cities representative wards were selected and average blocks in these wards were visited in a house-to-house canvass. A number of questions were framed, and a blank containing them was used with each young man between the ages of 16 and 35, who was questioned. The results of the inquiry are thus summarized in Association Men (New York, November):

"In the country, one in two young men go to church regularly; one in three occasionally, and one in fourteen not at all. In the city, one in four regularly; one in two occasionally, and one in seven not at all.

"In families where the father and mother belong to the same church, 78 per cent. of the young men are church members. In families where the father and mother are both Protestants, 32 per cent. of the young men are not church members. Where one of the parents is a Catholic and the other a Protestant, 66 per cent. of the young men do not belong to a church. Where the parents are members of Protestant churches, but do not belong to the same church, 50 per cent. of the young men of these families are not church members. When one of the parents is a Catholic, 44 per cent. of the young men do not belong to church. Where one of the parents is a Protestant, 51 per cent. do not belong to church.

"In the blank the following question was asked: 'Why are you not a church member?' To quote a few of the reasons given in their order of frequency: 'Indifference,' 'No reason,' 'Can be as good a Christian out of church as in,' 'No time because of work,' 'Haven't thought much about it,' 'Don't see the need.' It is interesting to notice that a very small per cent. of the men avow agnosticism."

A Short National Anthem.

Japan has perhaps the shortest of all national anthems. It is called "Kimi Ga Yo," from its first three words, and consists of thirty-two syllables, which count in poetry, however, as thirty-one. The exceeding brevity is due to the national fondness for conciseness of phrase and for economy of expression in all forms of art.

The patriotic song is what the Japanese call a "tanka," or verse of five lines, the first and third being of five and the others of seven syllables. Below is given the anthem in Japanese, with an English translation:

Kimi Ga Yo
Kima ga yo wa
Chiyo ni yachiyo ni
Sazare ishi no
Iwawo to narite
Koke no musu made.

TRANSLATION.

May our Lord's dominion last
Till a thousand years have passed
Twice four thousand times o'er told!
Firm as changeless rock, earth rooted,
Moss of ages uncomputed.

WHAT KNOX DID.

Scottish education, like most things of much worth in Scotland that have come down to us from the past, owes a great deal to John Knox. Knox, indeed, is commonly called the founder of the parish school system, and the man who has given to Scotland what educational celebrity it has since had; but this is only vaguely true. In the seething times of the Reformation almost all that was good and lasting in the nation, whether the gathered fruit of the past or the seeds of the future, was found with Knox, and got its living power from him; and so it was with education. Knox did not create the educational system of his country, he reorganized it and put new life into it. He found even the parish school system already made, and only adapted it to the wants of the time, and made it rest on the people instead of being supported by the ecclesiastics of the country. This is only what we should have expected, for a good system of education is not made, but grows.
