The inhabitants, to the number of over 3,000, of course, workers in the famous salt mines, and all the streets and houses are of the purest white imaginable. One of the most famous features of the city is the cathedral, carved in salt and lit with electric light, and when the late Czar Alexander visited it 11 years ago he was so fascinated with the magnificent effect of the light upon the crystal walls that he presented the cathedral with a jeweled altar cross. Such a thing as infectious disease is unknown in Kelburg; in fact, the majority of the inhabitants die of old age.

### Imperial Parliament Prorogued

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Parliament prorogued this afternoon by Royal commission. Only a score of members of the House of Commons were present when Black Rod summoned the Lower House to the House of Lords to hear the King's speech, which was an unusually lengthy recapitulation of public events since January, including the action taken in connection with Venezuela, regarding which the speech said: "I regret that the constant complaints which my government found it necessary to address to the government of Venezuela in regard to unjustifiable and arbitrary acts against British subjects and property during the last two years have been persistently disregarded and that it has been necessary for my government acting in concert with that of His Imperial Majesty, the German Emperor, which also has serious causes for complaint against the Republic to insist on measures of redress."

The speech refers to the conclusion of the South African war and adds: "There seems to be every reason to hope that material prosperity, greater than any the Transvaal and Orange River Colonies have yet experienced, may visit these regions and that all sections of the population may live together in friendship for each other and loyalty to the Crown."

Paragraphs deal with the postponed Coronation, the Colonial Secretary Chamberlain's tour, which together are expected to be of the "utmost value both in respect to their immediate effect and as precedents in the future."

Other topics touched upon were the expedition against the Mad Mullah and the co-operation of Italy therein, the acceptance by Chili and Argentina of the British boundary award, the Brussels Sugar convention and the alliance between Great Britain and Japan, "which I believe will be of advantage to both countries and contribute to the maintenance of general peace in the extreme east."

Parliament was prorogued until February 17.

LINE LEASED TO THE B. & A.

The new Fish River railroad was completed on Saturday noon and during the day the papers were signed whereby the Fish River Railroad Co. leases the line to the Bangor & Aroostook. The latter company will commence the active operations on the road on Monday morning when the passenger time table first printed in the Commercial will go into effect.

W. K. Hallett, formerly division superintendent in the Bangor offices, will have charge of the line and will have headquarters in Ashland. He however, will be directly under the orders of Supt. Brown in this city. The schedule which will be operative this winter includes one passenger train a day each way and a freight.

### THREE QUEER DISEASES.

There are two remarkable diseases, either or both of which may attack you if you elect to reside within the Congo basin, but you need have no dread of them if you live in any other part of the world. The patient is at first only drowsy, but ends by sleeping almost continually, waking only for meals or when forcibly roused. Finally the torpor becomes complete. He cannot be roused even to take food and dies of starvation.

The other disease alluded to is even more curious, although fortunately not nearly so deadly, and is known to specialists in tropical diseases as anhum, from a negro word meaning a saw, a very opposite name, for the most typical feature of the ailment consists in the slow amputation of one or more of the victim's toes by means of a serrated bony ligature that grows around the joint of the affected member just where it joins the foot.
