LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

Last week we printed Mr. King's speech, on moving his address in reply to the speech from the throne. In to-day's issue we give Mr. Hazen's reply, and also the speech of Premier Tweedie.

Mr. Hazen congratulated the mover and seconder. Both had proven that they are valuable additions to the ability and membership of the chamber. Mr. King he had heard when he appeared to better advantage than to-day. At the Sir Charles Tupper banquet when the agricultural and oil policies of the government, and the bridge charges were under discussion he had made a most admirable speech, but of course he had a better chance for making a speech condemning the government, and he hoped Mr. King would see the error of his ways, and return to his first love. The address was a remarkable document, brevity was not one of its characteristics. He could see in this speech the same hand that framed the manifesto to the electors of Kings and if it had the same result he would be satisfied.

Mr. Hazen said it was most extraordinary that the speech from the throne did not contain the slightest reference to Lieutenant Governor McClellan. It was always customary in the speech from the throne to make a pleasing reference to the retiring governor. But as the government had not seen fit to do this he (Hazen) from acquaintance felt that it was his duty to say that ex-Governor McClellan has discharged his duties constitutionally and impartially and in all things was ably assisted by the tact and good sense of Mrs. McClellan. (Applause).

There was no real reason to fear that the high plane established by former lieutenant governors would be detracted from by the present incumbent, and he felt satisfied that Governor Snowball would discharge his duties in a conscientious and constitutional manner.

He (Hazen) believed the cost of the reception to the Duke and Duchess—\$25,000 or \$30,000—was excessive, being three or four times larger than that incurred by the province of Nova Scotia, although the royal party spent a longer time in that province. While the reception was a success, whoever was responsible for what occurred on the barrack square was guilty of gross bungling. Altho' there was a host of military men in the square practically no protection was afforded the royal party while they were presenting the medals. In addition the people found it impossible to see what was going on as the duke and duchess were placed with their backs turned to the multitude. Moreover the premier owed an explanation for the insult sustained by the committee of the city council and the citizens' committee at the railway station.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie—"You are entirely in error, there were no citizens' committee or committee of the council at the railway station."

Mr. Hazen said a committee was appointed after consultation with Mr. Robertson, who had conferred with the attorney general.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley—"It is not admitted that a committee went to the railway station to meet the royal party and were obliged to leave the station."

Hon. Mr. Tweedie—"The provincial government were receiving the royal party at the railway. The reception was a provincial affair and the station, not being over large, it was not advisable that delegations from all parts of the province should be there. St. John delegation had no more right to go to the railway station than any of the other delegations, but they insisted on going and of course they could not be stopped."

Mr. Hazen said that it was in consequence of this action that the committee was turned down. The premier explains his conduct by the fact that the province was bearing the expense and that the committees

from other cities had as much right at the station as the St. John committee. This was an absurd excuse. St. John was refused the right to extend a welcome at the station, although aiding in defraying the expenses. It was doubtful if anywhere in England or in Canada the mayor was not on hand to extend the welcome.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley—"The honorable gentleman has been entirely misinformed. At a conference between the mayor and members of the common council and citizens' committee the question as to the order of the reception was discussed. As the duke and duchess were coming as the guests of the lieutenant governor, not of the province—or of St. John—it was thought better that the governor should receive their royal highnesses at the station. The question having arisen as to whether the mayor should be at the station, all thought it desirable that the mayor be at the exhibition building as it was inconvenient for him to be at both places. It was therefore distinctly understood that the lieutenant governor would receive the royal visitors at the station, and that the citizens' reception would take place at the exhibition. Notwithstanding this agreement, the citizens' committee was at the station, but the governor then considered it too late to change the arrangement."

Mr. Hazen said the statement given him was entirely different from the one made by the attorney general, which shows that the matter was so loosely arranged as to lead to a bungle. The speech, he continued, dealt very properly with the visit of the governor general, a worthy successor to his illustrious predecessor. He referred to Lord Dufferin, whose death was mourned throughout Canada. It was right that the speech should refer to the assassination of President McKinley, and he was glad that the government had wired expressions of sympathy. Such acts extended served to unite peoples. In Canada we have reason to feel grateful that while our people are not as wealthy as those in the neighboring republic they are happy and contented and have a great respect for law and liberty.

The governments laudation of the agricultural policy is intended more for campaign purposes. A government in power for 18 years ought surely to be able to claim that they have done something for the country. His quarrel with the government was that they claim credit due the late dominion governments which stimulated the dairying and agricultural interests of the province. That a former provincial secretary, the late Hon. James Mitchell, recognized this is shown by the reference to synoptic report of the debates of the session of 1889. All the provinces of the dominion have progressed as regards agricultural and dairying developments by leaps and bounds and it would be most remarkable if New Brunswick alone should stand still. The government has simply fallen in line with the other provinces.
