Crisis in the Far East.

Considering the very conflicting despatches now coming to hand it would be idle to attempt to explain how matters stand between Russia and Japan in the Far East. The one day it might almost be said that the decks were cleared for action, while the next day it is said that the prospect is more peaceful. One thing at least is certain—both Russia and Japan are dissatisfied and displeased with each other, and are now thoroughly prepared for war. It needs only a spark to start the flame, and that may be applied most any day when least expected. The other day it was dreadful lest the torch had been lighted by Russian officials having refused to allow the Secretary of the Japanese Legation at Seoul to land at Yongampo. A despatch on Tuesday, however, explained that even that had been explained away. The Russian Minister at Seoul had admitted that it was illegal on the part of his officials so to refuse, and had instructed them accordingly; so that has at least tided over one unpleasant matter which threatened immediate direful consequences.

The tension between the two is certainly at least temporarily relaxed, but the war cloud still hangs over them. As one contemporary here says—"War between Russia and Japan is certainly in the air, whatever the diplomats may say." Yet a despatch on Tuesday represents the Secretary referred to as saying that "the Press telegrams concerning the condition of affairs along the Yulu River are greatly exaggerated," while the Japanese Prime Minister, Katsura, now says that he deeply regrets the sensational and baseless news that was being telegraphed to Europe, and declares that Japan "is negotiating with Russia in the spirit of the Anglo Japanese alliance, which aimed at peace and the maintenance of the status quo; and," he adds, "it is fair to assume that Russia's objects are equally peaceful." That may be the object which Japan is ostensibly aiming at, but it knows well that it will never attain it without war, and that the fact of Russia retaining occupation of Manchuria in breach of its promise to the Powers to clear out shows that its objects are not peaceful, unless it is allowed to retain possession of that Province, which is the reverse of maintaining the status quo.

How can the negotiations between the two nations be proceeding "without a hitch," as Russian despatches state? Yet a Press correspondent at St. Petersburg asserts that "drafts of a Russo Japanese convention have been approved by the Czar and Count Lamsdorf, Russian Minister of Foreign Affairs," and says that "only a few alterations were necessary." Certainly if we were to believe the news received through Russian sources we would say "the differences between the two nations would soon be settled by a friendly compromise"; but then how would we explain the additional significant statement in the despatch—"meantime both Governments will continue their war preparations as precautionary measures, although neither aims at war?" It is also said that on Sunday the Russian cruiser Dmitri Drnskoj passed Copenhagen bound for the Far East. We are afraid no reliance whatever

can be placed on Russian news any more than on Russian promises.

But as we formerly pointed out, a compromise now between Russia and Japan will not end the trouble. The other Powers will never allow Russia to retain occupation of Manchuria. They know the Province might then as well be called Russian property at once, and that there would no longer be an "open door" there. So far as these other Powers are concerned that is the whole trouble in a nutshell, and the sooner it is definitely and permanently settled the better for the peace of the world.—Sel.
