A JUST DEMAND.

The collectorship at St John is vacant. Rumor has it that the person most likely to secure the berth is Hon. A. T. Dunn, solicitor general of this province. His appointment would be a good one, and likely to prove entirely satisfactory to the great majority of St John business men, as well as those not directly brought in contact with the official. An interesting situation would be created should Hon. Mr. Dunn decide to lay aside political life for the more remunerative and less exacting position in the gift of the federal authorities. A vacancy in the provincial executive, particularly the surveyor generalship, is one which demands a capable and energetic incumbent. Among the likely aspirants for the position we know of none whose claims should have greater weight than those of Mr. Wendell P. Jones, M. P. P., the astute and successful young representative of this county. Although comparatively new to political life, he has already made his mark in the house, where he is looked upon as one of the coming men. By strict attention to his profession he has built up a good legal practice, and demonstrated his fitness for any representative office in the gift of the electorate. But entirely apart from the many personal qualifications which Mr. Jones is so fortunate as to possess, there is the manifest duty of the premier to no longer disregard the claims of the western part of the province for representation in the executive. The upper St John valley, comprising the Counties of York, Carleton and Madawaska, has been without cabinet representation for many years. In fact within the memory of the present generation the only member of the government from these parts has been the Hon. H. A. Connell, who for about a year filled the fore-castle berth. It is certainly a little peculiar that a section of the province that has so repeatedly expressed itself as being in hearty accord with the administration should find its claims for cabinet recognition almost as repeatedly passed over. Carleton Co. has always until the present house had at least half its representation in support of the government, and it may be that the fact of its being left in the cold in some degree helped to bring about the result witnessed in the last local election. We believe, however, that the great bulk of the people are supporters of the government's general policy, and with a member of the cabinet representing the constituency, there ought not to be any difficulty in bringing the county still more in accord with administration. In the event of there being a vacancy we trust the premier and his colleagues will take into their most serious consideration the claims of this section. It is indeed fortunate that at a time when the county is seeking justice it has a member so worthy to fill a prominent position as is the gentleman whom we hope to see promoted at the first opportunity.

WHICH IS CORRECT?

A few weeks ago a certain member of the town council whose name we can readily give if any person fails to remember, stated that the method under which the Scott Act has been run this year is a revenue producer, and held up last year as an example of strict enforcement with no cash balance. Upon looking up the Scott Act report for last year in the town accounts we find a comfortable balance, equal to what is claimed for this year. Which of these explanations is correct—were the accounts cooked, or was the councillor merely talking through his hat?

Change In The Customs Staff.

Word was received from Ottawa on Wednesday that George Robinson, for many years employed in the Customs here, had been placed on the superannuated list with a generous allowance, and that his successor is to be Ex-Mayor U. R. Hanson. This change is one that will be well received. The retiring official was considered an efficient servant of the crown, but age and long service demanded favorable consideration of his claims for superannuation. The new official is an active and comparatively young man who will make an excellent member of the staff. In addition to the regular duties of the position it is understood that he will give some attention to the border trade which is such a handicap to local merchants. All parties seem inclined to congratulate both the gentlemen on the course events have taken.

BUY AT HOME.

This is the season of the year when a man and his money easily part company. The holiday goods are doubly attractive and the purse strings seem inclined to relax. As a consequence one finds himself making investments that might be put under the head of extraordinary expenditure. This is all very well on one condition, and that is, if you buy at home. The temptation is very strong to send the hard-earned coin of the realm to outside firms who offer big results from small investments, yet when the transfer has been made, the purchaser in nine cases out of ten, finds that he would have done quite as well had he patronized a local dealer, to say nothing of the saving effected in transportation on the goods, which is nearly always paid by the purchaser. The big departmental firms in Montreal and Toronto, at a conservative estimate made after careful investigation and inquiry, take each year no less than twenty thousand dollars from Carleton County buyers. Think what this would mean if the money were kept in circulation in our midst, instead of going to outside people who have no interest in this community other than a desire to hamper its commercial existence. There is another and perhaps almost as glaring an evil evidenced in the contraband trade carried on by New Brunswick people who far too often take a trip to Houlton. Just as good articles may be had in this town at no higher prices. It would probably startle most people if we were to name the estimate placed on the amount of illegal trading done in this manner. It is sufficient to say that for once the parties who persist in the game should try the experiment of buying in their own town and under their own flag.

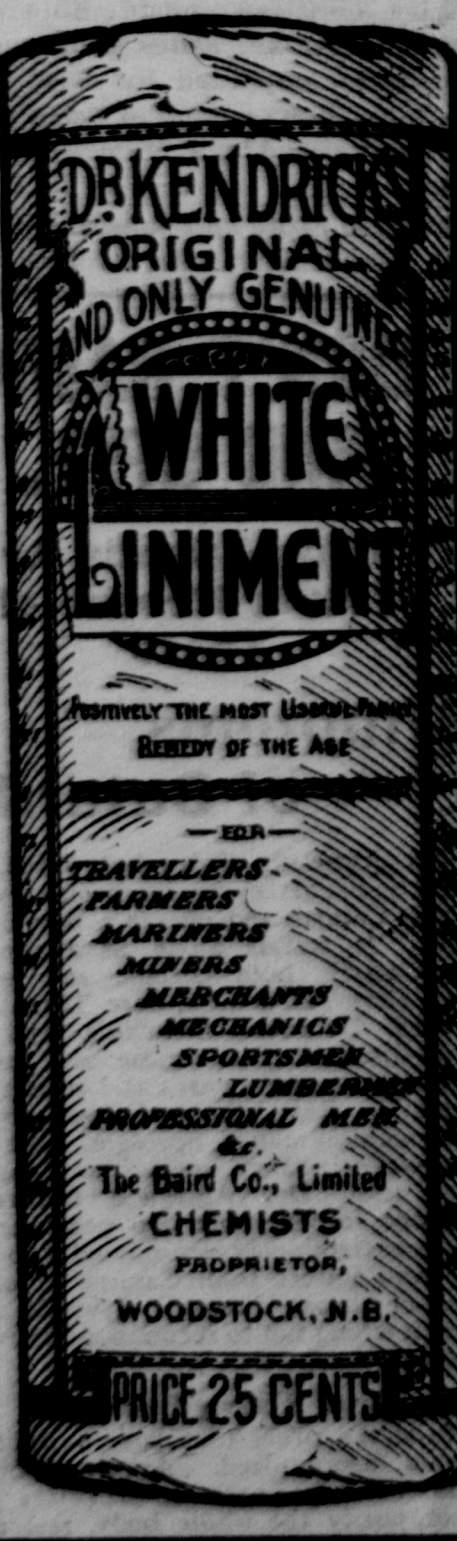
