

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



GRAFTING AN EAR.

Philadelphia, Nov. 24.-Dr. Andrew L. Neldon of New York has performed the operation of grafting an ear upon the head of a western millionaire whose name the surgeon says he is under bond not to reveal. The operation was to have been performed in New York, but District Attorney Jerome is said to have in-

"Dr. Neldon said to-day:-"The operation promises to be successful. It took place at a private hospital here, where I am assisted by a Philadelphia physician and one from New York. I think they will be willing to have their names known later. The two men were placed in opposite directions upon an elongated bed. One half of the volunteer's ear -the upper half-was cut off, together with about four inches of the nerve. skin behind the ear. This was twisted around and fitted to a freshly prepared wound upon my patient's by bandages, and the two men were bound so that they cannot move their heads. They must retain this position for at least twelve days
