Arrested While Visiting Her Dying Baby.

SAD MISSION BRINGS MRS. BREE INTO HANDS OF POLICE.

On the 26th of June last, Officer Crawford had his suspicions of the refreshment room kept by Mrs. Sarah Bree, on Brussels street. He paid a visit to the place, and after a search found eleven flasks containing liquor. These were concealed in an ingeniously contrived revolving table, in which only one flask could be made to appear at one time. Crawford confiscated the liquor and reported the matter to court. Mrs. Bree was ordered to appear in court the following morning. But instead of doing this she left the city early the next day with some man and had not been seen or heard tell of until yesterday, when she returned. Crawford met her on Brussels street this morning and took her to court. She pleaded not guilty to the charge of keeping liquor for sale and Crawford's evidence was taken. In defence, Mrs. Bree explained that she had left town with a friend for the purpose of seeing her mother in Buctouche and had come back to see her baby, who is dying in the hospital. This baby had been left on her doorstep and is a year old tomorrow. She forgot to mention anything about the liquor. Mrs. Bree was adjudged guilty and was fined fifty dollars or six months and will be sent to jail. As yet she has not seen the baby, who is in the hospital suffering from an abscess.—St. John Star.

NOT MUCH FOR CANADA.

PREFERENTIAL TRADE BILL OF NEW ZEALAND WOULD BENEFIT US.

Wellington, N. Z., Nov. 24.—The preferential trade bill, adopted Nov. 18, by the House of Representatives, places a duty of 20 per cent, on the following goods, now free from duty when from countries outside the British empire: Bicycle parts, gas engines, oil engines, gum boots, iron and steel cordage, sheet, bolt and bar iron, printing paper, railroad and tramway rails, sail cloth, canvas and duck and surgical and dental instruments.

The bill doubles the present duty on cement and adds 50 per cent to the duties on the following goods, when from non-British territory: Basket-ware, bicycles, boots and candles, carriages, chinaware, clocks, cordage, cream of tartar, earthenware, stoneware, fancy goods, toys, firearms, potted fish furniture, cabinetware, ironmongery, hops, nails, lamps, pianos, paper hangings, paper, plateware and pumps.

The duty on tea grown within the British dominions is removed.

The bill comes in force immediately after it passes the Upper House of the Legislative Council, which, it is expected, will be to-day.

Besides providing increased duties on the foreign goods stated, the bill provides for reciprocity with foreign countries making concessions to New Zealand products.

It is estimated that the increased duties will yield \$350,000 to \$400,000

against which is the remission of the tea duty, amounting to \$200,000.

The public is little interested in the measure. The opposition in parliament is mainly on the ground of rushing through important proposals during the last hours of the session.

They Beat the Dutch.

Cape Town, Nov. 25.—A complete count of the votes cast in the election on Nov. 11 for members of the legislative council shows that instead of the Bond, or Dutch, element having gained a victory, as was expected, the Progressives, or British, have a majority of one in the council. Cape Colony has been for some weeks past absorbed in a general election, in which Canadians as in duty bound, took the keenest interest. The Afrikaner Bond, under its various aliases, was working desperately for victory, which would mean the perpetuation of racial antagonism in Cape Colony, which is now the most serious political factor in the South African situation. Had fortune smiled on the Bond, its leaders, Messrs. Merriman and Sauer, would aspire to reproduce a situation similar to that existing before the war, but with Cape Colony in the position then occupied by the Transvaal, viz., as the centre of Boer ambitions. With the Bond party routed, it will be many years before it will be able to regain control of the affairs of the colony.

The Progressives worked splendidly under the inspiring and single-minded leadership of Dr. Jameson, who revealed powers of organization and statesmanship unsuspected by his friends. The disfranchisement of the rebels increased their chances of success, but the Progressives were hampered by the wobbling attitude of the Moderates, or Mugwumps, who refused to declare themselves on either side, and who would probably have handed over the government to the Bond should they have secured the balance of power in the new House of Representatives.

DANGER OF DIADDEM.

RUMOR THAT AN ATTEMPT WAS MADE TO POISON CZAR AND CZARINA OF RUSSIA.

Berlin, Nov. 24.—Sinister rumors come from Skiernewice, Poland, accounting for the sudden death of the little Princess Elizabeth of Hesse, niece of the Czarina of Russia, at the moment of a family reunion. The unfortunate little Princess and her father were the guests at Skiernewice of the Czar and Czarina, and it is now said that an attempt was made to poison the whole royal party. The Princess was the only victim, although the Czarina was made very ill and the Czar was more or less affected by the poison. It was for this reason that the Czar and Czarina did not attend the funeral of their niece, and it is now explained that they were too ill to attend. The accounts given of the illness of the Princess tally with the suggestion of poison. The Grand Duchess of Coburg, mother of the divorced Grand Duchess of Hesse and of the Czarina, is using all her influence to utilize the present sad event to bring about a reconciliation between her daughter and the Grand Duke of Hesse, but her efforts have availed nothing so far.
