They Beat the Dutch.

Cape Town, Nov. 25-A complete count of the votes cast in the election on Nov. 11 for members of the legislative council shows that instead of the Bond, or Dutch, element having gained a victory, as was expected, the Progressives, or British, have a majority of one in the council. Cape Colony has been for some weeks past absorbed in a general election, in which Canadians as in duty bound, took the keenest interest. The Africander Bond, under its various aliases, was working desperately for victory, which would mean the perpetuation of racial antagonism in Cape Colony, which is now the most serious political factor in the South African situation. Had fortune smiled on the Bond, its leaders, Messrs. Merriman and Sauer, would aspire to reproduce a situation similar to that existing before the war, but with Cape Colony in the position then occupied by the Transvaal, viz., as the centre of Boer ambitions. With the Bond party routed, it will be many years before it will be able to regain control of the affairs of the colony.

The Progressives worked slendid-ly under the inspiring and single-minded leadership of Dr. Jameson, who revealed powers of organization and statesmanship unsuspected by his friends. The disfranchisement of the rebels increased their chances of success, but the Progressives were hampered by the wobbling attitude of the Moderates, or Mugwumps, who refused to declare themselves on either side, and who would probably have handed over the government to the Bond should they have secured the balance of power in the new House of Representatives.
