The next speaker was W S Blair, horticulturist, Maritime Experimental Farm, who spoke on "Selection of Varieties of Apples, Top Grafting and Spraying." It was a most difficult subject to name the varieties of apple that should be suitable for our condition. He said the Wealthy was suitable for a large range of territory, but it was a Fall apple. We cannot combine a Fall and Winter apple. The fault of the Gano apple, is apparent to any who grew it. The Scotch Winter is too small an apple. The Mackintosh Red apple is supposed to be the height of perfection; the apple will mature well in Carleton county, while on account of temperature, it has not given satisfaction in Ontario, for the summer is not so warm there as it is in Carleton county. The Gravenstein apple will not do for New Brunswick. The best kind of apples for this province are the New Brunswicker, Wealthy, Famuse, Mackintosh Red, Alexander, Canada Red, Northwestern Greening, Windsor Chief, York Imperial, Golden Russet, Ontario, Bishop Pippin. Top grafting will make a tree production, when it has been a failure. He illustrated from a map, the proper mode for grafting trees. Budding is employed in fruits like plums, peaches, etc, but grafting is used on older trees. There is no better apple than the Northern Spy.
