EDITORIAL NOTES.

The speech from the throne at the close of parliament conveys the gratifying intelligence that the work on the surveys for the Grand Trunk Pacific is to be pushed with all possible vigor.

The C P R is again trying to hold up the people of St John. Unless they get far the best of the terminals owned by the city, they threaten to send some of their boats to Boston. The same trick was tried three years ago, though for a different purpose, but the voters took no stock in the threat, nor are they likely to do so now.

Some of the trash sent out by the conservative campaign managers in Montreal has reached Woodstock. The Montreal Star did more than anything else to defeat the conservatives three years ago by shipping tons of similar matter. A Bourbon never learns anything, so the experiment is being repeated. Nobody puts any faith in such nonsense nowadays.

Two important local by-elections took place in Ontario on Tuesday. At the Soo, Andrew McCampbell, the unelected conservative member, was defeated by C N Smith, liberal. This is a great victory for the government. On the other hand in Muskoka the administration lost a seat, Dr Hart being defeated by A A Mahaffy, conservative. Strange to say the campaign in that riding was conducted largely for the victors by R R Ganev, who went from post to pillar slandering judges and others. The effect of the elections is to leave the standing of the parties unchanged. The government now has 60 supporters and the opposition 46, with North Renfrew vacant. Premier Ross has put up a magnificent struggle for the past three years, in spite of almost unsurmountable difficulties. The indications are that he is safe in the premiership for some time to come.

MOCK PARLIAMENT.

For some time past a movement has been on foot tending toward the formation of a mock parliament. A large number have already signified their intention to become members and others are expected. It is quite likely that Young's Hall will be selected for the place of meeting. Probably everything will be arranged so that the members will be summoned for the dispatch of business some time next week. Those who have already joined have been given constituencies as follows:—

C L Smith is to be premier, and will select a cabinet from his supporters. H P Baird will lead the opposition, with William Balmain as first lieutenant, and C H Smith chief whip.

SUPREME COURT.

The circuit court adjourned on Wednesday. In the case of McKenzie vs Loane, the plaintiff was awarded the small sum of \$100. He sued for \$2100. A B Connell, K C, for McKenzie; F B Carvell for defendant.

E M Shaw sued Norman Hoyt and his two sons for trespass. The ownership of a certain tract of land was the bone of contention. The finding of the jury in regard to the disputed territory was in favor of the defendants, who were ordered to pay \$5 damages for a few trees they admitted were cut beyond their line. The claim was for \$200 damages. W P Jones, M P P, for plaintiff; F B Carvell for defendants.

The Phillips vs Nixon and Burt case was settled out of court, after which adjournment was made until Nov 17th.

 12. "Sanitation at factories."
