THE DEFICIT.

Everyone who knows the slightest fact in connection with the finances of the town is aware of the existence of a very large bank deficit, yet we are safe in asserting that nobody seems able, or willing if he possesses the information, to let the citizens know just where the town stands financially. Some few months ago we noticed the gradual increase in the debit balance, which at the time when the last figures were given out, was admitted to be in excess of ten thousand dollars. This is certainly a deplorable condition. A town having not more than three thousand inhabitants finds itself more than three, and probably nearer five, dollars per capita in debt on ordinary current expenditure. If this is not a time for all parties to stand together and say that such reckless management must cease, we doubt the existence of any period when it is necessary to call a halt. In this connection we respectfully direct the attention of our Town Council and the citizens generally to a clause in the act governing such matters which limits the amount of the bank debit balance to five thousand dollars. It may be said in defence by the members of the board that a sufficient sum in taxes has been lately received which very materially lessened the overdraft, yet it must be remembered that at the end of the year the deficit will again climb to serious proportions by reason of there being some twenty thousand dollars expenditure and probably not more than two thirds of this amount to be received in taxes after the period of discount has terminated. A courageous stand must be made against any expenditures not absolutely necessary, at least until the finances are in a far better condition than at present.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson is reported as stating that Hon. Mr. Blair will be supported by not more than one of his colleagues from this province in his stand on the railway question.

Confirmation by Bishop Kingdon.

At the close of the synod at Woodstock, Bishop Kingdon held confirmations in the neighborhood. In the succeeding eight days he held confirmations, drove 140 miles, and confirmed 133 candidates. On Sunday, July 12th, the confirmation was in St. Luke's Woodstock, when 17 were confirmed. In the afternoon the bishop drove to Richmond and confirmed 12; in the evening he drove to the house of an old invalid and confirmed him and his wife. On Monday Rev A W Teed drove the bishop to South Richmond, there five were confirmed. On Tuesday an early start took the bishop to Debec, where he took the train for Benton, where six were confirmed; and in the evening five were confirmed in Canterbury. On Wednesday the bishop went by train to Bristol, where the Rev E W Simonsen met him and drove him 70 miles about his mission and presented 70 candidates: Fifteen at Glassville, seventeen at Beaufort, eight at East Florenceville, fifteen at Centreville and fifteen at Greenfield. On Sunday, July 19th, the bishop confirmed six persons at Four Falls, and twelve at Andover.

While in Woodstock, on Tuesday, inspecting the stores of the 10th F B C A, Col. White, D O C, also inspected the Rifle Range, which he found in excellent condition. He has offered a Silver Medal to be competed for by the Rifle Club. The terms of competition to be arranged by the members themselves.

Cost, about two-thirds of one cent per night, per 16 c p lamp, and more than full measure in voltage—all that the lamps will safely stand without shortening their lives too much. This is a matter frequently neglected by unscrupulous Electricians, where they are not regulated by law. The saving of fire insurance, or the extra safety of lighting by this method, is alone worth all the light costs at the above figures, for light at these figures is little short of a gift. Early applicants may have the light free until 15th Sept. next. The many advantages of "Counterweight" lamps should not be overlooked.

Live Stock at Toronto Exhibition.

The directorate of the Industrial Exhibition at Toronto, this year to be held from August 27th to September 12th, and to be a Dominion affair, have decided that all fat and grade cattle shall be owned and fed by the exhibitor at least three months previous to the Exhibition. The ages of junior calves have been changed to read on or after January 1st, 1903. A class with same sections and money has been added for dairy bred cattle as for beef grades. In the shorthorn class the prizes amount to \$3,000, an addition of \$1,000, and twice as much as given at any other Exhibition in the United States or Canada, special or annual.
