THE North Ontario election, to supply the vacancy in the Dominion Commons, caused by the death of Angus McLeod, on Tuesday, resulted in the defeat of Hon. Geo. E. Foster and the election of George D. Grant, Liberal. Mr. Grant's majority is 181.

### A GOLF PROPOSITION.

The legislature meets late this year—the snow will have disappeared before the session is over, and the conditions will be favorable for outdoor sports. The game has at least two enthusiastic exponents in the new House, Mr. Jones of Woodstock, who has just been awarded a silver cup for the championship of his town, and Mr. Hazen, whose prowess in the popular sport is acknowledged. The opposition leader is physically most fit, having traversed every portion of Sunbury and a large part of the province during the past few weeks in search of political support. The new club could therefore start off with two good leaders, and should have no difficulty in experiencing a successful career. If Mr. Hazen cannot beat at the game of politics, here is an opportunity for him to run up against the government golf champion from Woodstock. ### SOCIAL NOTES.

Rev. ### ROYALLY BANQUETED.

John S. Leighton, Jr., one of the popular young men of the town, who had received and accepted the position of a sessional clerk in the House of Commons under the Hon. A. G. Blair, Minister of Railways, left for Ottawa on Wednesday. His many friends who could not let the opportunity pass, without some recognition as to their feelings toward Mr. Leighton, invited him to a banquet at Troy's restaurant on Tuesday evening, and presented him with an address and a beautiful gold watch chain and locket, the latter containing "Jack" and "1903," richly engraved thereon. The gentlemen signing the address printed below, and others, to the number of 60, were present.

J. R. Murphy, who presided, had on his right the guest of the evening, and on his left, Wendell P. Jones, M. P. P. Frank B. Carvell occupied the vice chair. Mr. Murphy thanked those present for asking him to preside at the gathering, which was of a two-fold character: first to congratulate each other on the result of the recent local election in which they were successful, in the face of a strong opposition, electing one of the ticket; second to do honor to a young man who has always been a strong Liberal, who has been honored with a high position in Ottawa. He then asked Mr. Leighton to step forward, read to him the following address and presented him with the chain and locket.

Dear Mr. Leighton,—Having learned that you have received the appointment of Sessional Clerk in the House of Commons at Ottawa, the duties of which will require your attendance there for a great portion of the year, and as you are about to leave us to enter upon the discharge of your duties we, a few of your many friends and admirers, in the Town of Woodstock, have met you here to-night for the purpose of extending to you our hearty congratulations on your new appointment, and to give you some tangible evidence of the esteem in which you are held by us who have known you from your boyhood until the present.

An operation was performed about ten days before his death, but his health was so far gone that it only gave him a grateful relief from pain before his death on Sunday morning. The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Cowan was about 28 years of age.

MISS ANNIE SMITH.

Miss Annie Smith, eldest sister of Herb Smith, formerly of this town, died in Bangor on Wednesday, March 4th. She had only been confined to her bed about ten days. Her remains were brought to Woodstock and the funeral took place from the residence of Mr. James Aughterton, Queen St. South, on Friday afternoon of last week. Mr. C. Herb Smith, brother of deceased, accompanied the corpse home.

AMOS HAYWARD.

Amos Hayward, aged 18 years, son of Sheriff Hayward, died at his home on Maple street, Monday morning, of consumption. He was a young man always enjoying the best of health until he was vaccinated some months ago, when symptoms of consumption appeared; while he was able to drive out on warm days, he gradually failed, and but little hopes had been entertained for his recovery. The remains were taken to his former home, Rockland, by Tuesday's express, for burial.

### A Great Musical Event.

AMERICA'S GREATEST CONTRALTO TO BE HEARD IN WOODSTOCK.

Not often does Woodstock hear a really famous singer, but on the evening of April 29th one of the greatest contraltos in the world will be heard here, that is Madame Mary Louise Clary, who has been engaged by F. G. Spencer for a tour of Canada, this spring. Clary is well known as the leading contralto on this continent. Her present home is in New York but she is of Southern birth. Since the world has been acquainted with Madame Clary's wonderful voice, and that is only about ten years, she has been on the top wave of popularity in the leading musical circles of the United States and Canada. Clary at present occupies the most important choir position in America, that of solo contralto of St. Patrick's cathedral, New York. Her time is continually filled with the best concert and oratorio engagements to be had, and it was only at tremendous expense that she has been engaged for this spring tour. Mr. Spencer claims for this noted artist the distinction of having the grandest contralto voice of any woman living, and proofs of this assertion will be advanced from time to time, which will also be calculated to interest all in the coming great musical event. Madame Clary will be supported by a splendid soprano, tenor and pianist.

### Murder at Bangor.

BANGOR, Me., March 8.—While performing ordinary duties at his office at a late hour Saturday night, Patrolman Patrick H. Jordan was shot in the head and instantly killed, in Carroll street, on the outskirts of the city. Within an hour of the time the body was discovered, William Alberts, a negro, had been arrested for the crime, and is now locked up awaiting the result of the coroner's inquest, which will take place this afternoon.

Alberts was born in Woodstock, and left here some ten years ago.
