## Death of the Hon. Frederick S. Risteen.

The Hon. Frederick S. Risteen, proprietor of the Copley Square Hotel, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. L. Smith, in Newton, at 4.20 o'clock, Wednesday morning, March 4th, from nervous indigestion, from which he had been a sufferer for about a year. A little over a week ago he became seriously ill and was taken to his daughter's home from the Copley Square Hotel, where for several years he had made his home. Mr. Risteen leaves a widow, one son and two daughters.

The Hon. Frederick S. Risteen was born at Jacksonville, N. B., in 1840, and came to Boston when 16 years old. It was in 1878 that he first entered the hotel business by leasing a small summer resort at Nahant, known as Hood Cottage, which he conducted for five seasons. His next venture was the leasing of the Rose Standish House at Downer's Landing and he also had a successful season at the Point of Pines, when, it was said, every other proprietor there lost money. He was at one time proprietor of the Hotel Clarendon. In October, 1891, he secured the Copley Square Hotel, at that time one of the newest and finest in the city.

As a Democrat his political career began in 1872 by his election to the common council from ward 10, with re-election in 1873. In 1872 he was counted out by the common council by one vote, his opponent being the Hon. J. Q. A. Brackett, Republican, but the council reconsidered, and Mr. Risteen was seated. For a long time he was a trustee of public institutions.

In 1883 he was elected to the state senate, and was a member of the committee that investigated the famous Tewksbury alms house case, and a signer of the minority report. In his candidacy for the senate, in 1889, he was defeated by the Hon. Charles Carleton Coffin, Republican. Mr. Risteen belonged to DeMolay Commandery, Knights Templar, and other fraternal bodies.

Ottawa, March 5.—Sir William Mulock received, a communication from the Imperial Government agreeing to allow the reduction in the rate of postage for newspapers which the Canadian government has for a long time been seeking. Accordingly on and after Saturday, the 7th instant, the rate on Canadian newspapers and periodicals posted in Canada for transmission to England, will be the same as if posted for delivery in Canada.
