ANXIETY.

The mild-mannered editorial contributor to the *Press*, who as everyone knows, is no stranger to its columns, seems unduly troubled over the delay in filling the cabinet vacancy caused by Mr. Blair's resignation. How great the contrast, he remarks, when the wicked Tories ruled the roost. In the halcyon days of Macdonald, Abbott, Thompson, Bowell and Tupper there certainly were plenty of cabinet ministers from this province. Most of the time one good man could have done all that fell to the lot of two, and often we think, the interests of the Country would have been better served had there been none at all. We suppose the fact of a nice fat salary being so long undrawn seems so utterly unorthodox to Tory eyes that we can forgive the comment. Just to reassure our contemporary that the situation will not always be vacant, we advise it to keep an ear to the ground. Some of these days the official announcement will be made.

A CHANGE OF FRONT.

It is truly amusing to notice the change that has come over the opposition press concerning Hon. A. G. Blair. When that gentleman saw fit to leave the Laurier cabinet he was hailed by the lights of the Tory party as one of the greatest patriots this country had ever known. The reason for their admiration was not hard to see.

It was fondly hoped that the ex-minister would join the Borden-Tarte outfit and go over bag and baggage to the Tory party. The opposition was so sure of this that even in St. John some of the leading members of the party actually met in conclave and congratulated themselves upon the accession to their ranks. New Brunswick's first parliamentarian was not to be so easily made a victim. His opposition to the government was solely upon the merits of the railway bill. Aside from that he had no differences of opinion with his colleagues, a fact he has taken special care to make apparent. He had no intention of becoming a second Tarte. The fury of the opposition warriors is now directed against him with greater vigor than before. Why is it that the man who in July was a saint is now a sinner? Simply because he refuses to become a cat's paw for those who have persecuted and vilified him during the last twenty five years. The righteous *Sun* will shed crocodile tears over the sin of opportunism, and of course overlook its friends, who are the greatest sinners in that respect.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

A couple of the members of the council tell us there is no more drunkenness in town this year than for some time past. But will they go so far as to say that one cannot obtain a drink any easier than when the town was united with the county for Scott Act purposes, or that there is less liquor sold. Don't all speak at once, gentlemen.

The town council did well to insist upon a better service being given the citizens than the present "ten o'clock lights out" system provides. The engineer no doubt feels that midnight is a late hour at which to knock off for the day, yet if previous officials worked that late we see no reason why he should not, if equal remuneration is received. At any rate the people want the lights on until twelve, and will see that they get them, too.

Great Scotch and Gaelic Singers Will be Here Dec. 2nd.

Never in the history of Woodstock has such an opportunity occurred to hear the music of Scotland by great artists from the Old Country as upon the above date. To hear the greatest of all Scotch tenors which alone would be in itself an attraction which would rank with the memorable Jessie MacLachlan concert, but besides George Neil the celebrated tenor, will be heard the finest Scottish Violinist that ever drew a bow, namely Mackenzie Murdoch, the Paganini of Scotland, who on many occasions has appeared before Royalty, playing the airs of Scotland as no other violinist has ever played them. One of the most accomplished mirth provokers in Scotland is Harry Munro the celebrated character comedian, he will also be in the fine company, together with Flora McIvor Craig, Soprano and Alfred Lawrence Murdoch, pianist. Jessie MacLachlan has popularized Scottish music here and made the people anxious to hear other great artists, and in this instance that desire can be more than satisfied.

WOODSTOCK GOLF CLUB.

A meeting of the Golf Club has been called in Graham's Opera House, (W O T U room), for this evening at 8 p.m., at which the presentation of three silver cups and two prizes to successful competitors will take place. These beautiful cups would do credit to a much larger Club than Woodstock; so also would the players who were skillful enough to win them.

The Dalling Cup will be presented to Mr. Clarence Sprague, who played the eight rounds in 378, an average of 47. The possession of the Cup carries with it the honor of playing first on the team.

The Ladies Handicap Cup goes to Miss Jessie Denison, who holds the record of the links, (103 for two rounds).

The Ladies Championship Cup, which is solid silver and handsomely engraved, was won, after a close contest by Miss A. Marion Rankin, defeating Mrs. A. D. Holyoke in the finals by 3 up and 2 to play.

Each of the trophies must be won three years consecutively before it becomes the property of the holder.

In a recent handicap competition, Mrs. A. D. Holyoke and Miss Porter broke even and carried off a prize offered by Miss Thomson of St. John, and another by Mr. E. W. Mair.

Some of the other successful competitors this year were Mrs. R. V. Dimock, Misses Ethel Bourne, Katherine Denison and May Clark.
