### AN AMERICAN VIEW.


Lord Alverstone's stand on the Alaskan Boundary dispute comes in for a great deal of adverse comment, not only in this country, but by some of the most impartial observers in the United States. The Scottish American Journal prints the following:—

As we stated last week, we sympathise entirely with Canada in her disappointment at the Alaska boundary decision; and if the members of the Tribunal had had any sense of justice we do not see how such a decision could ever have been given against the Dominion. It is evident, however, that Lord Alverstone had such a very exalted idea of his own importance that he considered the two Canadian Commissioners, Sir Louis Jette and Mr A B Aylesworth, of no account whatever and unworthy of being consulted even in any manner of way. So long as the great Lord Alverstone, presently Lord Chief Justice of England, was satisfied all others were of no account whatever. The United States Commissioners had only to pamper that inordinate vain, self-conceit, in order to carry everything their own way, right or wrong; and undoubtedly they did it. At the first meeting of Lord Alverstone with these two Canadian Commissioners, the former admitted and said that the Canadian regarding the Portland Canal was absolutely unanswerable, yet without consulting his two colleagues any more about it Lord Alverstone practically abandoned that claim and gave two (Kannaghunot and Sitkian) of four islands in the United States; and that "without either rhyme or reason," except to please this country. Not only were the views of the Canadian Commissioners on that matter entirely ignored, but certain decisions were submitted for their signature concerning which they had never even been consulted!

At their first meeting after the hearing of counsel on both sides was concluded the whole six members of the Tribunal unanimously agreed to give to Canada all the four islands referred to in the Portland Canal, and yet Lord Alverstone afterwards revoked this, and further not only gave (virtually then unasked) two of the islands to the United States, but asle some territory, near Dyea, Canada also right to which had never been disputed. Alverstone's conduct is truly beyond comprehension, and no wonder the Canadians have protested. The decision, however, in the Alabama case was equally unjust, and Britain then made a protest, but all to no purpose. And now, as we said, Canada can only "grin and bear it."


