A BRITISH DISASTER.

Aden, Arabia, April 23.—The British transport "Hardinge" arrived here to-day from Berbera, the capital of Somaliland, East Africa, and confirmed the report of a British defeat in Somaliland. The officers of the "Hardinge" say that ten officers and 174 men, out of a total British force of 220 men, were killed recently in an engagement with the Somalis. The Somali losses are not known.

London, April 23.—The War Office to-day received from Brigadier General Manning, in command of the British forces in Somaliland, a despatch dated twenty miles westward of Galadi, Somaliland, April 18, as follows:—

"I regret to report that a flying column, under the command of Colonel Cobbe, which left Galadi on April 10, to reconnoitre the road to Walwai, had a most serious check on April 17. On the morning of April 17 Colonel Cobbe was at Gumburu, 40 miles westward of Galadi, and had decided to return to Galadi, owing to the serious difficulty in finding the road to Walwai and to the shortness of water. He was about to leave his zebra (protected camp) when firing was heard in the direction of a small party, under the command of Capt. Olivey, which had been sent in a westerly direction to reconnoitre.

At 9.15 in the morning Col. Cobbe despatched Col. Plunkett with 160 men of the 2nd Battalion of the King's African Rifles, 48 men of the 2nd Sikhs and two Maxim guns for the extrication of Captain Olivey, if necessary. As a matter of fact Captain Olivey had not been engaged. Col. Plunkett, on joining the detachment continued to push on. At 11.45 Col. Cobbe heard a heavy fire in the direction taken by Col. Plunkett and about one in the afternoon, a few fugitives coming in reported that Col. Plunkett had been defeated with loss.

"The news has been fully corroborated since, and I have to report the total loss of Col. Plunkett's party, with the exception of 37 Yaos, who have arrived here.

"The latest report from the fugitives is to the effect that Colonel Plunkett pushed on after the enemy's force to the open country, seven miles westward of Gumburu, where he was attacked by a very strong force of mounted troops and the enemy's infantry, who attacked at close quarters. He kept back the enemy until he had no more ammunition, when he formed a square and charged with bayonets fixed in the direction of Col. Cobbe's camp. He moved some distance in this manner but a great many men, including Col. Plunkett himself, were killed or wounded by the pursuing enemy.

At last the enemy's infantry overwhelmed the square and annihilated them all, with the exception of the 37 fugitives above mentioned.

The despatch closes with a list of the officers and men missing, and no doubt killed in action, namely Col. A. W. V. Plunkett, Captains Johnston, Stewart, Olivey, Morris and McKinnon and Lieutenants Gaynor and Bell, all of the King's African Rifles; Captain Vizey, of the 2nd Sikhs; Captain Sime, of the Indian Medical Staff; two white privates, 48 men of the 2nd Sikhs, and 124 men of the African Rifles. The two Maxim guns also were lost.

Another despatch from General Manning, who immediately on hearing of the defeat of Col. Plunkett, started for Gumburu with 400 men, says further information reached him from Col. Cobbe to the effect that the latter, with 220 troops, was encamped with plenty of food and supplies and four days' water. He has about one thousand camels and does not think he can withdraw from his position without assistance, because the scrub is thick and the enemy's forces seem likely to act on the offensive. General Manning adds: 'I march again directly and expect to arrive at Gumburu to-morrow at noon. I shall accomplish the extrication of Col. Cobbe, with as much transport as possible, and return to Galadi. I can only catch sufficient water for the march to Gumburu, returning directly. I shall, therefore, be unable to advance against the enemy if the latter holds back.'

Aden, Arabia, April 25.—Brigadier General Manning, after an engagement with the Mad Mullah's forces, has relieved Colonel Cobbe, near Gumburu, Somaliland. About two thousand of the Mullah's men were killed. The British loss is not known.

The few details obtainable of the reverse to Col. Plunkett's detachment on April 17 show that the Mullah's force consisted of 2,000 horsemen and 10,000 spearmen. They surrounded Col. Plunkett's force in the open and the Somalis, after a heavy rifle fire, charged repeatedly with their horsemen and spearmen on all sides. The British detachment held out until its ammunition was exhausted, and then charged with the bayonet, but it was ultimately overwhelmed by weight of numbers. The British force fought until all its officers and 180 men were killed.

Most of the handful of men who reached camp were wounded. The Somali losses are reported to have been enormous. The Mullah's forces are reported to aggregate from 30,000 and 40,000 mounted men, and about 80,000 spearmen.

Fred Goodspeed, accomplice of murderer Higgins, attempted to escape from the Reformatory a few nights ago, but the attempt was frustrated. He was armed with a knife and a club, and evidently intended to resist capture.

Misses Iddles and Yerxa of this city, who are to join the teaching staff in the normal school at Johannesburg, sailed by the Lake Manitoba last Tuesday.

P. Nase & Son, Ltd., of Indiantown, have absorbed the hardware business of McMullin & Jordan and the general provision and grocery business of the J. W. McAlary Co.

About 1300 head of cattle were shipped from here to England last Tuesday.

It is proposed to put two new steel steamers on the river in competition with the Star Line.
The local government is to be asked for a contribution of \$500 toward the cost of the Soldiers' monument under erection in Riverside park. It should be cheerfully given and probably will be.

TALKING ABOUT CANADA.

In 1775 the loyalists of the American Colonies flocked to Canada. The same feeling is still strong. Even if England were disposed to trade off Canada for some American possessions, the Canadian people themselves would never consent. The ideal condition probably cannot be expected for hundreds of years. Probably the people of the United States would object strongly against union with Canada, just as Canadians themselves would object to an absorption by their greater neighbor. One thing is particularly noticeable in this connection. American capital is flowing over the Canadian line much more rapidly than it is going to many of the older sections of this nation. American capital evidently has confidence in the stability of the Canadian and British Governments. Capital never goes as freely to the West Indies or the South American countries, where the natural wealth is so much greater, because of the inherent weakness of the Government and the low standards and the feeble political ideals of the people.—Worcester Spy.
