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THE proposal to vote a bonus towards the establishment of a stock farm at Gagetown, Queens County, has been vetoed in the Legislature.

THE Winding Ledges Dam project was referred to the committee on private bills, who referred it to a special committee, which virtually means that the project has got its quietus for at least another session of the Dominion parliament.

PROF. JOHN BRITAIN, travelling instructor for the group of manual training and gardening schools, was in Woodstock last week, and consulted with the board of school trustees, as to the prospects of establishing a department of manual training and gardening, in connection with the Woodstock schools. The trustees were very favorably impressed with the idea and no doubt the matter will have practical development at an early date. As we understand it, the land for this garden is supplied by the town and the tools, etc. are furnished by the McDonald fund trustees.

PREMIER TWEEDIE'S budget speech in the Legislature, last week, was an able presentation of the present prosperity and future hopeful prospects for New Brunswick. He was able to prophecy, with a justifiable degree of faith, that there would be a considerable surplus at the close of the present fiscal year.

Among the important items of legislation introduced was an increase in the rate of stumpage, and that a new Highway Act would be submitted to the house.

J. K. Flemming replied to the Premier in a speech which an opposition paper says, "was very ably delivered". His criticisms were comparatively mild and in some things he found himself compelled to agree with the Premier.

Clary Concert.

So many and so complimentary remarks had been previously made concerning the great contralto singer, Miss Clary, that those who attended the Opera House Wednesday evening were prepared to enjoy a rich musical repast, and they certainly were not disappointed. The highest compliment that can be paid this great contralto Clary is to say that she fully met all the encomiums which had been passed upon her, fully justified the flattering press notices that had been given. She was ably supported by Mrs. F. G. Spencer, soprano; Mr. J. A. Kelly, tenor; Miss Olga Smith, accompanist. Frequent encores were called for and pleasantly responded to. There was a good and highly appreciative audience present.

BAND CONCERT.

A number of business men, interested in the production of good music and anxious to assist the 67th Regt. Band in its intention to give a series of open air concerts during the summer, subscribed sufficient to erect a portable band stand, in the square, and the Band occupied the stand on Tuesday evening. The claim made that the Band was second to none in the Province was fully borne out on the occasion, for, in the presence of a large body of delighted spectators, and under Bandmaster R. S. Dixon, the following program was excellently rendered:—

Notes from the Legislature.

Mr. Jones introduced a bill to amend the Woodstock Electrical Railway Light and Power Company Act, and a bill to amend the Act for the incorporation of Bath village for water and fire purposes.

Mr. Tweeddale presented the petition of the school teachers of Victoria for an increase of salary. The speaker ruled it out, because it called for public money.

Since the first of the year 78,697 persons have left the United Kingdom for foreign countries. Of the total 43,532 were British born, and of these, 28,113 went to British possessions, 13,986 to the United States, and 1,403 to other foreign countries. Emigration has not been so brisk for many years.

The King vs. Elijah G. Tompkins. Indictment for arson. J. R. Murphy, Esq., K. C., represented the Crown. No bill. John S. Leighton, Jr., was chosen foreman of the Grand Jury.

The case F. H. Hale vs. John S. Leighton, Jr., commenced on Tuesday with the following jury: John Coffey, Judson Briggs, Miles Clark, George Britton, Allen McLean, W. C. Rideout and C. E. Stephenson. The witnesses called by the plaintiff's lawyer were D. McLeod Vince and F. H. Hale; the witnesses for defence were J. W. Dalling, G. A. White, and John S. Leighton, Jr. The jury retired at 6 o'clock Wednesday evening, and returned shortly after 10 o'clock, with a verdict for the defendant.

The case was very bitterly contested by both parties. The contention of the defendant being that the note in question for \$400 was given for plaintiff's accommodation and entirely without consideration. During the progress of the case it developed that Hale and Leighton in 1892 purchased a large amount of property from the St. Stephen Bank, which had formerly belonged to Leighton's father, under an agreement that when the property was paid for and certain enumerated notes retired, which together would amount to about \$8,000, the balance of the estate was to go to Leighton.

The property was sold by Hale for about \$14,000 and for a time Leighton believed that he had received for it a much smaller amount. Sometime in November last Leighton received certain information all of which was fully confirmed today.

The outcome will probably be a very spicy equity suit. A. B. Connell, K. C., for plaintiff; F. B. Carvell for defendant.

OBITUARY.

ROBERT PHILLIPS.

One of the best known citizens of Grafton, Robert Phillips, died very suddenly of paralysis, on Wednesday, at 8 Hayden's, Riley Brook, Tobique, where he had been employed by J. J. Hale. The deceased was 70 years of age, and leaves one daughter, Mrs. John Chestnut, of Grafton. The remains arrived in Woodstock, Thursday afternoon, accompanied by the brothers of deceased, Messrs Zopher and Wm. Henry; Mrs. Smith of California, is a sister of deceased.

LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

In the House of Assembly, on Tuesday, Hon. Mr. Tweedie moved, and Mr. Hazen seconded the following resolution, which was adopted:—

Resolved—That this legislature desires to place on record its sense of the loss which Canada has sustained by the death of Sir Oliver Mowat, lieutenant governor of Ontario, one of the fathers of confederation, owing nothing to the advantages of fortune or of high birth, he, by the force of his intellect, steady industry and unblemished character, won his way to the highest positions that his country could give him, attaining to a seat on the bench, the premiership of Ontario, a seat in the senate and cabinet of Canada, and finally the lieutenant governorship of the province of which he had been the premier for the unparalleled term of 24 years.

As one of the fathers of confederation he became actively identified with the greatest event in the history of Canada. While as premier of Ontario he showed his great ability as a constitutional lawyer and upholder of provincial rights, he so won the regard of the people by his moderation and good sense that his appointment as lieutenant governor of the province with which he had been so long identified, met with general approval, and he has gone down to the grave universally regretted, and leaving a name and reputation that will not soon pass from the memory of the people of Canada.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Pugsley, rule 79 was suspended to allow the introduction of a bill to authorize the Bishop of Fredericton to hand over certain trusts to the synod.
