TUESDAY, the Thirteenth day of October next.

Fifteen days public notice of the time and place of holding election to be given by Parish Clerks by posting in three of the most public places of the parish. Nomination of candidates to be filed with the Parish Clerk or left at his residence at or before six o'clock pm, on Monday, the 5th day of October next.

Parish Clerks to post names of Candidates in three of the most public places in each Polling District on or before Thursday, 8th day of October next. Candidates' names also to be posted up at the Polling Place before the opening of the poll on day of Election. The Parish Clerk or District Clerk (as case may be) to act as chairman unless he refuses to serve, or is absent, of not competent by reason of relationship to candidate, when chairman to be chosen by electors present.

Assessors are required to furnish Parish Clerks with list of electors.

Note that time for holding election has been changed by Bye-Law of County Council passed at January Session 1901. Formerly under Acts of 18.0, Chap. 34, it was the last Tuesday in October, but now it is the second Tuesday in October.
