GREECE AND MACEDONIA.

The approaches between Greece and Turkey in connection with the Macedonian uprising have a strange look in view of the fact that it is only five years since Greece was in arms against Turkey for the protection of the Macedonian Christians. Easily as Turkey, under Edhem Pasha, vanquished Greece, she now values the good will of that little country and may be willing even to make concessions to secure it; and, much as Greece smarts under the defeat she then got, she is less afraid of the effort Turk than of the aggressive Slav and Teuton. What is wrong about the present uprising in her eyes is that it is Bulgarian and not Greek and that it has invoked northern and not southern aid. Ever since Greece became an independent nation the most earnest wish of her people has been for the extension of her territory so as to include Macedonia and Albania, as well as Crete and the islands in the Aegean Sea. now in rebellion against the Sultan, the Greeks have no sympathy or affinity with the latter in other respects. The disastrous war referred to was entered upon by the Greeks with the hope of extending their borders and in anticipation of the designs of Austria and Bulgaria on the Macedonian port of Salonika. The population of Greece has been increasing at a high rate and has overflowed into the European provinces of Turkey till at present most of the cultivated land almost up to the walls of Constantinople is in their hands. Greek merchants have also been pushing their trade and fear that, if Austria or Bulgaria should get possession of Salonika and Russia seize Constantinople, Grecian commerce with the east and west would be destroyed, and all aspirations for the union of the Greek speaking peoples crushed forever. This is the principal reason for the Greeks siding with Turkey. They think that if Macedonia is to be separated from Turkey, its true and natural destiny is union with Greece. More than this, they hold that should the Turk be driven out of Europe the kingdom of Greece should be extended to the Bosphorus as a balance of power in eastern Europe and a barrier to the advance of Russia to the Mediterranean. There is an old prophecy, as old as Turkish rule itself, that when a Constantine and a Sophia reign together the Eastern Empire will again rise to life, and the cross will be restored to the dome of St. Sophia in Constantinople. The name of the present Crown Prince of Greece is Constantine, and Sophia is the name of his wife. With all his keen commercial instincts the modern Greek is superstitious. The spirits of the old sibyls yet linger in the caves and grottoes of his hills, and he believes that the day when the prophecy will be fulfilled is at hand. The people of Italy fully sympathize with the aspirations of the Greeks, and are strongly opposed to the southern extension of Bulgarian, Austrian or Russian power. But Greece is too feeble to oppose the two great northern powers in whose hands Europe appears to have left the task of restoring peace in Macedonia. The insurrection is spreading and gaining some notable successes. All European Turkey seems now involved in the conflagration, and there is no telling how or when it will end. —Montreal Witness.

THE STOCKING ROOM.




