





The people of Italy fully sympathize with the aspirations of the Greeks, and are strongly opposed to the southern extension of Bulgarian, Austrian or Russian power. But Greece is too feeble to oppose the two great northern powers in whose hands Europe appears to have left the task of restoring peace in Macedonia. The insurrection is spreading and gaining some notable successes. All European Turkey seems now involved in the conflagration, and there is no telling how or when it will end.
