MR. GAMEY, the Conservative member for Maitoulin, has in the Ontario Legislature, brought a serious charge against Provincial Secretary Stratton, for an attempt to bribe him to desert his party and support the government. Mr Stratton promptly and emphatically denied the charge. Premier Ross at once moved that the matter be referred to two Judges of the Supreme Court for thorough investigation. Hon Mr Stratton very properly tendered his resignation, but the government would not accept it, thus fully accepting all responsibility in the matter. In the meantime a fair minded public will withhold judgment until after the investigation.

The Woollen mill had a narrow escape from destruction by fire Monday afternoon. The fire caught upon the roof but the prompt response to the alarm by the firemen enabled them to extinguish the blaze after damage was done that will necessitate a new roof.

Capt. Duncan had the misfortune to fall down a flight of stairs in his residence on Monday morning last. He received a severe shaking up and some bruises, but fortunately no bones were broken. He has been confined to his home since, but his friends hope for his speedy recovery.

Ganong Bros large candy manufacturing establishment was destroyed by fire on Saturday last. Loss estimated at from \$75,000 to \$100,000, with an insurance of some \$45,000. The fire was caused by a girl who took a lighted paper to light a gas jet, dropping the paper it fell on a celluloid tray which instantly flamed up causing the disaster. Messrs Ganong state that in two weeks time the factory will be turning out its usual quantity of chocolate and seventy-five per cent of its other productions.
