Dedication at Glassville.

The new Presbyterian church, at Glassville, was dedicated to the worship of God, on Sabbath, March 8th. Although the day was unfavorable, three services were held, at each of which a good congregation assembled. The Rev Kenneth McKay, of Houlton, Maine, U.S., preached in the morning, the Rev A. D. Archibald, of Richmond, in the afternoon, and the Rev J. H. Anderson, of Greenfield, in the evening; and their excellent discourses were highly appreciated by the people. The services throughout were impressive and edifying.

The cost of building and furnishing the church, which was commenced in May, 1902, was \$2,688.35. Of this sum, \$2,010.11 had been paid before it was opened, leaving a debt of \$678.24. The collections on the day on which the church was dedicated, amounting to \$103, reduced it to \$575.24. Through a canvass during the week, of our energetic building committee, Messrs John McIntosh, James Love and D. H. Lamont, who began by contributing very liberally themselves, and the hearty and generous response with which their appeal met, the pastor was able, on Sabbath, the 15th inst, to make the cheering announcement to the congregation that the debt was completely extinguished. The building reflects great credit on Mr. L. McFarland, of Hartland, the contractor, who stands high in the estimation of our people, as well for his sterling qualities as a man as for his ability as an architect. The painting of the interior of the building, which has been done in a very tasteful and artistic manner, is the work of Messrs Parker and Jewell, of Woodstock, of whom we will always have the most pleasing recollections. To Mr. McFarland, for his present of a neat communion table; Mr. A. Henderson, of Woodstock, for his gift of three handsome chairs for the pulpit; Mr. Andrew Mack, of Amherst, N. S., for three beautiful collection plates with appropriate scripture texts carved on them; Mr. M. Welch, of Bristol, for his very liberal contribution, and to all others outside of the congregation who have assisted in bringing this undertaking to a successful issue, the Presbyterians of Glassville feel deeply indebted, and will ever be grateful to them for their kindness and generosity.

GEORGE RAMSEY.

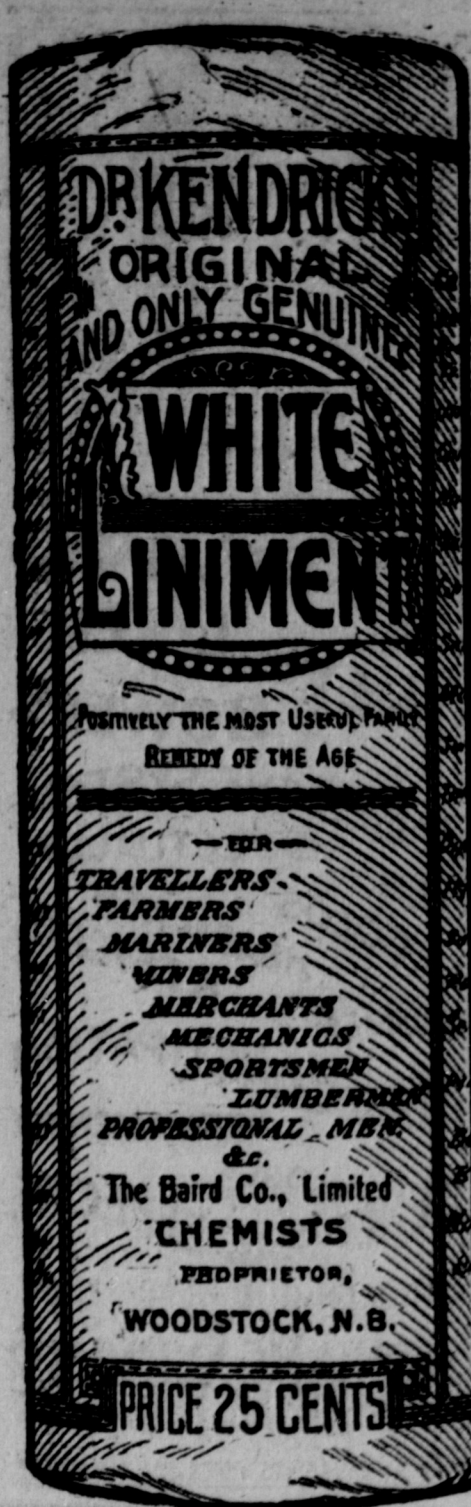
George Ramsey, one of the oldest residents of Monticello Me, quietly passed away on Feb 3rd, 1903. Mr Ramsey was born in Aberdeen, Scotland, Oct 16th, 1814, and came to St. John with his parents when a small boy. At an early age he learned the shoemakers' trade and when a young man went to Gagetown and located, and there on Oct 5th, 1837 he was united in marriage to Miss Sarah Briggs, daughter of Hiram and Dannie Briggs. To this union were born eleven children, only four of whom, with his aged wife, survive him. Deceased removed to Monticello about 31 years ago, where he worked industriously at his trade until two years ago, since that time he has been gradually failing in mind and body, but was only confined to his bed about one week previous to his death. Mr Ramsey was converted at Gagetown, N. B., about 50 years ago, and united with the Methodist society of that place. After removing to Monticello he joined the M. E. church under the pastorate of Rev F. H. Osgood, and was elected one of the Stewards of the church which office he filled to within a few years of his death. He was very much esteemed and respected both in the church and community at large. He made a great many friends who unite in loving sympathy with the aged widow and family in their sad bereavement.

BAPTIST QUARTERLY MEETING.

The Carleton and Victoria Co's Baptist Quarterly Meeting met with the Baptist church at Bristol, Car Co, March 10, at 3 p. m. A devotional service of one hour, conducted by Rev C. N. Barton, in which many made grateful mention of the mercies of God, very appropriately opened the first session. The reports from the churches, which were then listened to, were encouraging when we consider that this Quarter has extended over three cold and severe winter months, when county roads and county church buildings are not the most comfortable places to be. The speaker of the evening service was Rev R. W. Demmings, who chose as his text John 8:36 "If the Son therefore shall make you free ye shall be free indeed". Notwithstanding the heavy rain, a respectable audience was given the speaker whose discourse was not only pleasing but helpful and appropriate. An attractive feature of the service was a solo sung by Miss Alveretta Estabrooks. On Wednesday morning after brief devotional exercises, a paper was read by Rev B. S. Freeman, B.A., on "Individual Work". The paper revealed the writer's practical knowledge of the subject. Being as it was both instructive and suggestive it stimulated a discussion which was most helpful, participated in by pastors Barton, Demmings, Fash, Stirling, Smith and Bro D. V. Boyer. A series of questionings on the subject of "Revival Meetings" was then conducted by the secretary. The following questions were asked and suggested answers given by pastors Barton, Demmings Fash and Stirling respectively. 1. Should we have special revival meetings or should the evangelistic work of our churches be done by the regular prayer and preaching meetings? 2. Should we call in evangelists to conduct such work? 3. Should the endeavour be to get the church in good condition first by having subjects applicable to them only or should we begin with the sinner at once? 4. Do you think it well to receive persons into fellowship with the church while they are yet without the spirit of evangelistic meetings? The discussion which followed each answer was spirited and helpful. In the afternoon, Pastor Barton opened a discussion on "How we are to interest our churches in Home mission work". A suggestion of Pastor Fash, that the pastors of the Quarterly have a scheme of exchange of pulpits, made the discussion the more interesting and profitable. The result was a resolution to appoint a committee to draw up such a scheme of exchanges. Further discussion was had concerning the condition of some of the weaker churches within our Quarterly. A most pleasing and harmonious spirit prevailed all the discussions, so we were in a receptive mood as we filled the church on Wednesday evening to listen to the Quarterly sermon as preached by Rev Z. L. Fash, M. A. The preacher chose as his text, John 3:16 noting there, 1. The Gospel Mystery, 2. The Gospel Duty, 3. The Gospel Benefits. His discourse was most lucid and fresh on this mysterious and well worn theme, "The love of God to Man." A quartette composed of Messrs Freeman and Barton, Miss Estabrooks and Mrs John Farley pleased the audience with their splendid rendering of the song entitled, "Whisperings of Jesus". The evangelistic service which followed brought to its close a Quarterly which beside being interesting was most profitable and practical. An invitation to meet with the Centreville church in June was accepted. REV. W. H. SMITH, Secretary.
