Britain's Food Supply in War.

An agitation has been started in Britain to urge upon the Government there to appoint a Royal Commission to inquire into the question of the security of the food supply of Great Britain in time of war. Last week a large and influential deputation waited upon Premier Balfour by appointment, and several very interesting addresses on the subject were delivered. In replying to these Premier Balfour expressed the opinion that the danger Great Britain had to meet was not the exclusion of grain and of the raw materials necessary for the country's national existence, but the cost of introducing them. He entertained no doubt that the country could at any time—even during war—get all it wanted if it was prepared to pay the price, and the question of price, he said, was ultimately a question of insurance. The Premier thought that in considering this subject sufficient stress was not laid upon the part neutrals would play in the event of a war. There would be more than sufficient neutral shipping to supply Great Britain with grain, though, perhaps, not with raw materials. The country was exposed to the danger of a "wheat corner" at any time—in peace as well as in war.

Nevertheless the Premier admitted that an inquiry into the whole matter was advisable. It would, at least, tend to allay some unfounded fears, and, at same time, show that some of the difficulties of the situation could not be wholly removed.

He thought this inquiry should include the questions of insurance, the conditions of modern maritime warfare, the methods by which commerce could be protected and destroyed, and the amount of the actual grain supply of the country. Mr. Balfour significantly remarked in concluding, that he hoped nothing would be done to establish a Government machinery which would injure the national commercial machinery by which Great Britain was at present supplied.

In connection with the Premier's concluding observation it may be mentioned that over a billion dollars' worth of food is imported to sustain the population of Britain, which outsiders describe as "one vast workshop." After paying for food and drink the surplus of its production is exported. The other day the Commercial Intelligence said the exports of manufactures alone last year amounted in value to two hundred and thirty millions of pounds sterling, and this week we find a contemporary here vaguely stating that Britain's exports amounted to three hundred and sixty-five millions—but whether pounds sterling or dollars it does not say. We fear this vagueness is often intentional. When millions of money is spoken of here the people naturally consider it dollars, and when the contemporary is called in question for thus belittling Britain it simply replies that it meant pounds sterling—just five times the amount implied. The balance of trade, however, has little bearing on the question of Britain's food supply in time of war.

Our contemporaries here apparently love to expatiate on the direful effect to Britain in event of food supply from this country being from any cause stopped, but they should at the same time consider the ruinous effect it would also have upon the United States. Britain is not only the best customer of this country, but one which it cannot now possibly do without—and prosper. During the last calendar year Britain bought \$73,000,000 worth of this country's hog products, \$86,000,000 of its wheat and flour, \$30,000,000 of its beef, and \$38,000,000 of its corn—all in a single year. This money was just as essential to the one as the goods were to the other. But while this country could not get along well without Britain as its best customer, it may well be doubted if the latter is equally behold to the former. Britain, we maintain, could get all

INVASION OF CANADA.

AN INTERESTING PAPER READ BEFORE THE COLONIAL INSTITUTE.

In his paper, "The Canadian West and Northwest," which was read recently at the meeting of the Royal Colonial Institute, London, Mr. W. Albert Hickman said he did not believe that the American invasion involved the slightest danger to British interests. He had the pleasure of going north in the Saskatchewan country with a special train containing 166 American capitalists to buy Canadian land. The train was placarded "Special Train of the Saskatchewan Valley Land Company," which company bought no less than one million acres of land. He had studied the invading army carefully and it impressed him that the majority of them appreciated British institutions, and became good Canadian citizens with great rapidity. He looked upon this investment of many millions of American money in Canadian lands as but the forging of one more chain in the already existing informal alliance—the Anglo-American confederation. Figures led him to the inference that in 15 years the United States would not be exporting one bushel of wheat. All would be required for home consumption, and her wheat lands would all be under cultivation. The United Kingdom might then look to getting her wheat supply from the Canadian plains—and much of her supply of meat and dairy produce also. Some of them who were in that room would eat bread made from flour of wheat grown in the valley of the Peace River as sure as day was day. Last year the Hudson Bay Company sent a \$10,000 roller flour mill into Fort Vermilion on the Peace River, and for all he knew some of them might have eaten bread from there already.

The World's Coal Powders.

By far the most valuable of our mineral products is coal. In this age of steam and electricity, when cheap power is the very life of a nation's industry, coal is king. Professor John Tyndall said that the seat of England's greatness was her coal mines. Without them, she could never have become the mistress of the world's manufacturers; and without them she could not remain the mistress of the seas.

But Great Britain's coal lies two thousand feet below the surface, and is mined in a temperature of one hundred degrees or higher. There are prophecies that the supply will be exhausted within fifty years, and it is stated that the mines of Germany and the Netherlands are still nearer exhaustion.

The coal supply of Europe is distributed as follows: Russia has twenty seven thousand square miles, said to be of poor quality; Great Britain, nine thousand; Germany, three thousand, six hundred; France, one thousand, eight hundred; Belgium, Spain, and other countries, one thousand, four hundred.

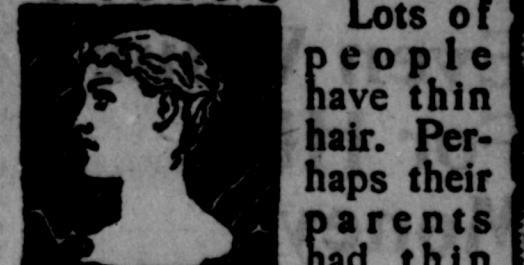
The United States has one hundred and ninety-four thousand square miles of coal-measures, which is more than four times the area of all the coal-fields of Europe, twenty-one times the coal-fields of Great Britain, and forty-one per cent of all the coal areas of the world.

Not less than thirty of our states and territories are now producing coal for the market. In West Virginia, forty-eight counties out of fifty-four have coal deposits. Ohio has had at one time two hundred and sixteen large mines, besides three hundred and eighty-three small ones, distributed through 30 counties. Of the twenty-four states and territories west of the Mississippi, coal has been found in every one save Minnesota.

In 1870, Germany raised more coal than the United States, and Great Britain, nearly four times as much. In 1880, the United States had passed Germany, but Great Britain raised more than two tons to one from the United States. In 1900, the United States led the United Kingdom by eighteen million tons, and produced more than twice as much coal as Germany. The United States product is now more than one-third of the world's annual supply. Josiah Strong, in March "Success."

Religious Liberty in Russia.

The Czar's decree of religious liberty and of civil reforms, under the guidance of persons having the confidence of the people, unless it aborts like the similar one of the poor young Emperor of China, is one of the great events of history. It not only means the emancipation of the people from the diabolical alliance of secular and spiritual tyranny under which they have been ground down, but the emancipation of the Czar from a thralldom which has held him in leading strings hitherto and frustrated all his naturally noble impulses and aspirations. It is evident that the struggle has been precipitated for which the Czar has presumably been preparing. The question now is whether the generous and modern Czar who realizes that his own interests are one with those of his people or the combination of ecclesiastical and police despotism will come out uppermost. It was hoped that when M. Plehve was appointed to the Czar's cabinet that it meant a broader administration than before. Yet it is only a day or two since we had a report of certain reactionary expressions of his with regard to the newspaper press, when he prohibited the celebration of the bicentenary of Russian journalism because journalism had caused all the internal troubles which Russia had known in forty years. By the same reasoning the fixing at the valves of an over-charged boiler would be the cause of the explosion, instead of being the only hope of safety. Of all political follies the worst of all is sitting upon the safety valve. Wisdom lies in making it as responsive to popular feeling as possible. This surliness of the Minister of the Interior, reputedly the most liberal man in the cabinet, did not prepare us for the pending revolution.
