## CARLETON CO. COUNCIL.

WEDNESDAY, JAN. 14.

(Continued from last week.)

Council came to order at 10 o'clock.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read by the Sec-Treas.

Coun Gallagher said that last year the expenditures were \$9500, but that there would likely be a refund from the local government from smallpox account and jury fees of \$1192.16; balance due on current account \$2,000. He thought that \$9,000 would be a sufficient assessment for the current year.

Coun Bohan thought it better to make the assessment larger, for it was better to have enough money than not enough. He thought if the assessment was low this year and they were compelled to increase it next year, a good deal of dissatisfaction would arise.

On motion Coun Williams, seconded Coun Merrithew, the assessment was placed at \$9000, with quarter of indebtedness of each parish added.

Scott Act Inspector Colpitts reported as follows:—

To the Warden and Councilors of the Municipality of the County of Carleton:—

GENTLEMEN—I have placed my account as Scott Act Inspector, for the year 1902, in the hands of the County Auditor, by which it will appear that there is due me the sum of \$12.64.

During the year I had 49 Scott Act cases, of those there were 19 convictions made and 30 cases were dismissed.

During the year I paid into the hands of the Sec-Treas the sum of \$921.

The committee on Inspector Colpitts' report, presented the following:—

To the Warden and Gentlemen of the County Council of Carleton:—

GENTLEMEN—We, your committee, beg leave to report that, after very carefully going over the accounts of Inspector Colpitts, we find that many of the charges are not itemized, and after questioning Mr. Colpitts with regard to the matter, we therefore recommend the payment of the same, and that hereafter the Inspector's accounts must be fully itemized, setting forth the number of miles travelled by each and every officer and all expenses connected therewith; and we further recommend that no counsel be employed when the defence is not conducted by counsel, and also all detective work connected with the same.

Coun D Phillips explained that in 33 cases no defence was made and \$165 thrown away as attorney fees. It was considered right that every item should be explained.

On motion of Coun Gallagher, the bill of Inspector Colpitts was read to the council again, the Inspector being on hand to make explanations.

Coun Saunders moved, seconded by Coun Bohan, that the account lie on the table, and the further consideration be deferred until the Inspector returns from the town with certain books required.

Coun Brown, on behalf of the committee on Dr. Curtis' bill regarding the Board of Health, made a report showing that \$1004.05 had been paid in connection with the smallpox epidemic last year. Since then bills amounting to \$583.53 had been con-

tinued.

Coun Bohan explained that Dr. Curtis charged \$15 a day, to visit Grafton, to save the expense of retaining Dr. Sprague, who was visiting the patients there every day, as Curtis thought two visits a week was all that was necessary.

Coun Brown thought Dr. Ross' bills, which were not itemized, was a large one to pay without explanation.

Coun Gallagher thought that the bill should be attested to.

Coun Saunders explained that the board of health had power to vote these bills, but the council had not.

Coun Brown said Coun Saunders was a peace-at-any-price-man, and was too anxious to be pacific.

Coun Skinner said it was time to stop paying bills they were not legally bound to pay.

Coun Merrithew thought that the report should be received and a sharp recommendation be made to the board of health on its work in reference to these bills.

Coun Brown thought that the bills of the Union Telephone Company and Dr. Ross should be looked into and that the Sec-Treas should explain his bill for \$25.

The Sec-Treas gave satisfactory explanation as to his charge of \$25 for professional services, and assured them that if the same amount of work had been done for either of the councilors the bill would be twice as large.

Coun Merrithew asked for a written report from the committee as to the items to which exception would be made, and a motion to that effect was carried.

Coun Kearney explained that he had opposed the grant to the hospital as it was the people's money, that was being voted, not because the merits of the Hospital did not de-

tracted for, and that the smallpox expense was about \$1600. As chairman of that committee he wished to say that it was understood that some of these items would bear criticism.

The annual report of the board of health was then read by Coun Brown as follows:—

To the Warden and Councilors of the Municipality of the County of Carleton:—

GENTLEMEN—I beg leave to submit the annual report of the local Board of Health for District Number 10, for the year ending Dec. 31, 1902. Smallpox visited the District again this year, appearing first at Grafton, the infection no doubt coming from Woodstock.

There were forty eight cases in Grafton and five in other parts of the County. Every effort was made to stop the spread of the disease and to do it as cheaply as possible. Dr. Sprague was employed to attend the patients and Mr. George Hale, the agent of the Board for Northampton, was engaged to look after the quarantine and supply the different families with the necessities of life. There was no further spread of the disease after the Board took charge.

Diphtheria appeared early in the year in the parish of Kent, and in the effort to stamp out the disease some money was spent. At the present time, with the exception of some cases of measles, there are no known cases of infectious diseases in the County. The statement of the money expended during the year accompany this report as does also an estimate for the year 1903.

Coun Brown said he had no written report prepared but he understood, as one objection he wished to impress upon the board, that smallpox patients were not only supplied with necessities, but with luxuries, by Dr. Curtis. He did not think that the secretary of the county board of health should be given carte blanche to expend the money to be provided by the county.

The Sec-Treas explained that the board of health was a body corporate which had power to contract these bills and if the county refused to pay them, the board could appeal to the local government and the warden would be called upon to show cause why the bills were not paid. Great power was placed in the hands of the board of health which the government, no doubt deemed necessary.

Coun Williams wished the reporters to place this matter before the public, showing the powers of the board.

The Sec-Treas said the county council might refuse to pay the bills, but the warden would be called to show cause, and if he cannot, the county would be compelled to pay the bills and other costs as well.

Coun Merrithew asked what would happen if the warden could show a just cause why the council did not pay the bills.

The Sec-Treas answered that if a good cause were shown it would satisfy the government, but, if not, extra costs would be added to the bill which the county would have to pay.

Coun Saunders thought that while there were some little items that might be criticized, the bills on the whole were fair and that it was poor policy to take up time with them.

Coun Williams thought that Dr. Curtis' charge of \$15 a day for attending patients, was strange, considering his explanations last year that the amount allowed by law was only \$12 a day to doctors attending smallpox patients.

Coun Bohan explained that Dr. Curtis charged \$15 a day, to visit Grafton, to save the expense of retaining Dr. Sprague, who was visiting the patients there every day, as Curtis thought two visits a week was all that was necessary.

Warden Carvell—Out of order, you cannot vote away other councilors' money. Start a subscription paper.

On motion Coun Giberson, seconded Coun Simonds, the list of parish officers, Wicklow was confirmed.

On motion Coun Hay, seconded Coun Merrithew, the list of parish officers, Richmond was confirmed.

On motion Coun Lamont, seconded Coun Skinner, the list of parish officers, Aberdeen, was confirmed.

On motion of the councilors for the respective parishes, the following amounts were ordered to be assessed for poor purposes: Richmond \$700, Brighton \$100, Peel \$250, Wicklow \$150, Aberdeen \$350, Parish of Woodstock \$500, Kent \$300.

On motion of the councilors for respective parishes, the parish clerks were paid as follows: Peel \$2, Wicklow \$2, Brighton \$3.

Coun Bell said W. A. Atkinson paid a poll tax in Wakefield, and he was not a resident.

On motion Coun Bell, seconded Coun Shaw, he was refunded \$1.50, and charged to Wakefield.

Coun Bell said Thomas Johnston, of Wakefield, claimed to be over assessed, and asked relief of the council. On motion the matter was referred to the parish assessors.

Coun Merrithew said that the returns of Road Commissioner Henry Crabb of Richmond were incomplete and Commissioner Kennedy failed to send in any report, consequently the councilors for the parish could not render a favorable report, and these commissioners could not receive their commissions until the councilors had seen them.

On motion \$100 was assessed on Wicklow, land damages, to be paid to Lee Kennedy, and \$77 to be paid to Mr. Burpee for expenses.

On motion Coun Gallagher, seconded Coun Bohan, \$37, land damages, was assessed on Kent, to be paid to C. H. Phillips.

On motion Coun Forrest, seconded Coun Bull, land damages were assessed on the parish of Woodstock, amounting to \$98, in connection with the Kelly hill, so called, \$60 to be paid W. Scovil, \$30 to J. H. Thompson and \$8 to John Lenehan.

On motion Coun Bell, seconded Coun Shaw, \$600 was ordered assessed on Wakefield, \$400 to the poor. (Continued on third page.)
