## THE SENATE.

The Senate of Canada consists of a body of men appointed by the government for life. Unlike the members of the house of commons, who do not require any property or residential qualification, a senator must be worth \$4000 over and above all encumbrances. He must also be a resident of the province which he represents, and in Quebec he must reside within the district for which he sits, there being twenty four divisions in that province. During the seven years of power held by the present government, there have been no less than forty seven appointments to the Senate, and in consequence of this, the upper house contains a good working majority favorable to the administration, about fifty five of the senators being either members or adherents of the liberal party. The remaining twenty five or six comprise the remnant of the once all-powerful party that so effectually blocked the early legislation of the Laurier administration. Now, however, Sir MacKenzie Bowell is shorn of his influence, and the actual leadership of the chamber is in the hands of the veteran Senator Scott, who is so ably assisted by the member of the cabinet without portfolio, Hon Wm Templeman. Of the senators appointed at confederation, the only survivor is Hon David Wark, in his one hundredth year, who is undoubtedly the oldest legislator in the British Empire, and a lively one at that. The other New Brunswick members are Senator Ellis of the St. John Globe, Hon Jas Dever, also of St. John, Hon George G King of Chipman, Hon George T Baird of Perth, Hon Peter McSweeney of Moncton, Hon Pascal Porier of Shediac, Hon Jas Denville of Rothesay, Hon Fred P Thompson of Fredericton, and Hon Josiah Wood of Sackville. Of these, the only out and out opponent of the government is the last mentioned gentleman. One or two of the others occasionally oppose it, but in the main support the administration. The remuneration of a senator is fifteen hundred dollars per year.

The Sun gravely announces an election within five weeks or a year. This is about the choicest bit of information we have yet received from our cheerful though generally inaccurate contemporary. It might have said within two years, which would be correct as everyone knows, and yet convey about as much enlightenment.

To read some of the opposition papers would give an unsuspecting individual the idea that the Laurier cabinet contains fistic scrappers of a high order. Such nonsense will not for one instant be believed. There has been only one nest of traitors in the history of Canadian public life. Sir Mackenzie Bowell will furnish information on the subject.

The daughters are Mrs George Howard of Woodstock, Mrs John Grant of Middle Southampton, Mrs H Grant of Canterbury, Mrs G A Trott of Gas-pereaux, Queens Co.; Mrs S Hatch of Everett, Mass.; Miss A Sanborn, Providence, R. I. The sons are Levi of Rockland, Carleton county, and Fred of Woodstock. Five of the daughters of the deceased hovered over her bedside for some four weeks endeavoring to restore her to health again, but all efforts failed, for the Saviour, in whom she trusted for upwards of sixty years, had said unto her, "come unto me and rest," so she fell asleep and quietly passed away. The funeral service was conducted by Rev Joseph Noble, F. B., and the remains were interred in the F. B. burying ground, Southampton.

## S. S. CONVENTION.

The Parish of Woodstock S S Association met in convention at Benton on the afternoon and evening of the 27th of July. The Field Secretary Rev A Lucas was present.
