A MARKED CONTRAST.

As the amount of ill temper shown by the more rabid Conservative journals is usually in proportion to the intrinsic excellence of the Government's measures, it is fair to presume that the character of its reception that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway project has a great deal to recommend it to public approbation. This presumption is confirmed by an investigation of the scheme itself, and especially by a comparison, which becomes a contrast, between the terms of the Canadian Pacific agreement of 1881 and those of the Grand Trunk Pacific agreement coming before Parliament for adoption. Nothing could show better than such a comparison does, how far this country has advanced in the last twenty years. The following are some of the points of contrast:—

1. The Canadian Pacific Railway is from end to end the property of the company which was chartered and subsidized to build it; the Dominion will own one half of the Grand Trunk Pacific, and will be part proprietor of the other half through a lien held as security for a guarantee of interest. The difference is too marked to need emphasizing.

2. The Dominion Government constructed two long and costly sections of the Canadian Pacific—from Kamloops to the Pacific Ocean—and made a present of these completed portions to the company; the Grand Trunk Pacific from Winnipeg to near the Atlantic Ocean will be built by the Government, but will remain the property of the people of Canada in perpetuity.

3. As far as it was possible to do so the Dominion Parliament gave the Canadian Pacific Company a monopoly of the traffic of the whole Dominion west of Lake Superior, by prohibiting the building of other lines, except such as would of necessity become feeders of the Canadian Pacific; the Grand Trunk Pacific Company must take its chances in competition with existing trunk lines and with any others that may hereafter be chartered and constructed.

4. Parliament granted to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company virtually absolute control of transportation charges west of Lake Superior; the absolute control of such charges on the Grand Trunk Pacific will be vested in the Dominion, not in the company. The difference is made clearly apparent by the fact that in this respect the Canadian Pacific cannot be brought under the control of the Railway Commission now being created by statute of the Dominion Parliament, while the Grand Trunk Pacific will be placed under that control by the terms of its charter.

5. No attempt was made by Parliament to grant running powers to other companies over the portion of the C. P. R. constructed by Dominion Government; running powers over portion of the G. T. P. constructed by the Government may be obtained by any other company, subject to the operative control of the Grand Trunk Pacific Company so far as that is necessary to the safety of passengers and property.

6. Parliament granted to the Canadian Pacific Company the right to "use and hold" the land on the beach and under high-water mark in navigable waters "to such an extent as shall be required by the company for its railway and other works"; no such sweeping franchise will be conferred on the Grand Trunk Pacific Company, and, therefore, no such monopolistic terminal control as the Canadian Pacific Company enjoys at the country's expense at Fort William.

7. Parliament granted to the Canadian Pacific Company a subsidy of \$25,000,000; the only financial aid given to the Grand Trunk Pacific Company is a guarantee of interest to the capitalists who furnish the means of constructing the line. Under this arrangement the Grand Trunk Pacific will benefit by a lower rate of interest, which will not cost the country anything.

8. Parliament gave the Canadian Pacific Company 25,000,000 acres of land, including the privilege of exploiting town sites; not an acre of land, except for right of way and station facilities, will be donated to the Grand Trunk Pacific. To enhance this discrimination the Canadian Pacific lands were made free of all kinds of taxation for twenty years unless "sold or occupied." This has so far been held to mean twenty years from the actual specific conveyance of the lands to the corporation, not from the date of the agreement—a difference which means many additional millions of dollars to the Canadian Pacific Company.

HORSE NOTES.

Report says that Lord Derby (2.051) has an ailing tendon.

It is probable that Prince Alert (2.00) may take a shy at the pacing record next fall.

There are 500 horses in training at Lexington, Kentucky. At Columbus about 200 head are quartered. Mr. George Ketchum's contemplated trip with Crescens (2.021) this season covers a distance of about six thousand miles.

McChesney is working well and should be in shape for the Harlem Handicap, which will be worth over \$8,000 to the winner.

Harry New will be blistered and turned out. This horse won the Latonia Derby last year, and great hopes were entertained for him.

The fastest mile trotted so far this season, in a race, is 2.151, by Gold-dust Maid (2.141) daughter of Silver-thorne (2.15), at the late Pueblo, Col., meeting.

There is a horse out in Michigan that is claimed to be fifty-three years old. He is sound and smooth, but runs at large the year round, and has not been harnessed for fifteen years.

Only men of unlimited wealth can afford to breed for speed alone. The man of moderate means, who desires to make money in the business, must aim to produce beauty, style, pleasant dispositions, soundness and size sufficient to meet the demands of a majority of customers.

It is announced by the New York Sun that the Lord Derby-Deimar match race has been declared off on account of a quite severe lameness from which Lord Derby has been suffering in one hind leg during the past two weeks, caused by stepping in a hole when jogging.

It is probable that the list of Axtell's standard performers will be considerably increased this season. It is announced that W. P. Jiams of Terre Haute, Ind., now has eighteen sons and daughters of Axtell (3) (2.12) in training. Their ages range from two to five years, and not a pacer among them.

A mare that will be twenty nine years old next August is doing duty on the stage line between Rumford Falls and Andover, Me., and does her part of the work too. She is as round as an apple and masticates hay and oats without difficulty. She is of the Brandywine stock.

A shoe that will make a horse with a mixed gait trot squarely is one that has long been sought by American horsemen. W. H. Lake, an English horseman, who has been studying American training systems at Memphis, says he has overcome the difficulty. Mr. Lake's invention depends for its efficacy upon two steel bars welded on the shoe. For horses of different gaits these bars of course are arranged differently, and their effect, according to the inventor, causes the hoof to meet the ground in the much desired square manner.

The mile trotted in 2.061 by Lou Dillon, at Cleveland, is not only the fastest mile of the season, either trotting or pacing, but is the fastest mile that was ever trotted so early in the season, and is the fastest mile by a five-year-old mare, being one-quarter of a second faster than that made by Susie J. last season. The last quarter of a mile was trotted at a 2.01 gait and it begins to look as if the story that went with the mare this spring was not so much "hot air" as a good many thought. It also looks as if she might be of championship timber.
