### Benton.

July 14th.

Confirmation service was held at St. Mary's church this p.m. Bishop Kingdon was present and several candidates were confirmed.

There was a large representation from Benton L O Lodge, on Saturday at the celebration of the glorious 12th held at Canterbury Station. As the day was fine the attendance was large. At the close of the march, speeches were delivered by C A Lewin, P G Director, and Rev J E Flewelling, P G Chaplain.
