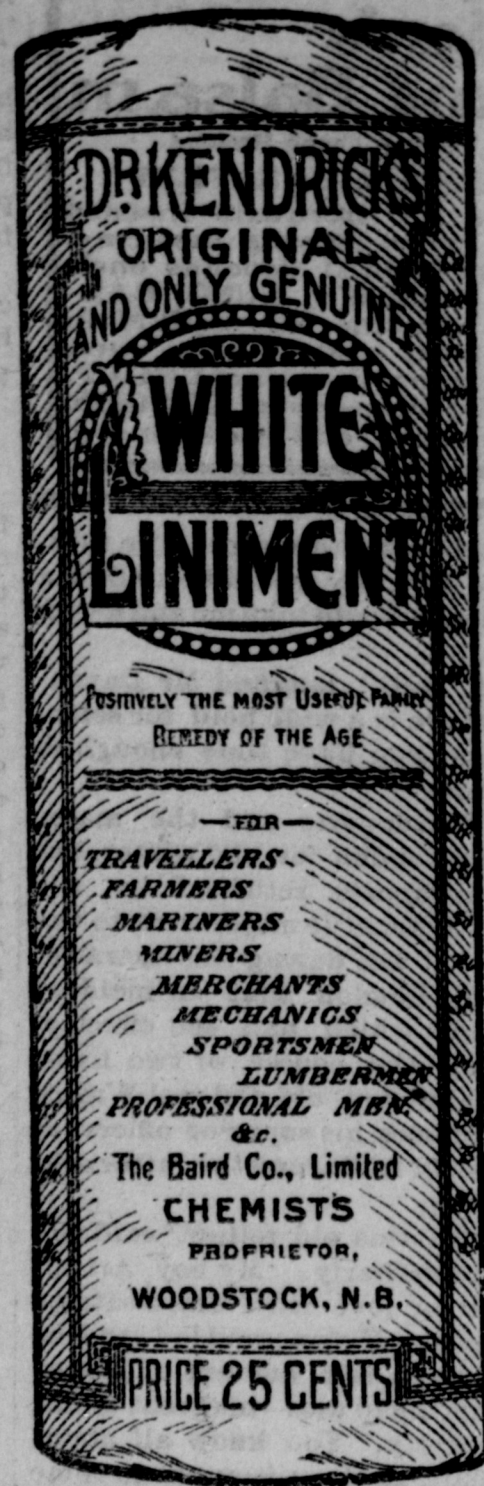
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VANCOUVER LETTER.

Vanconver, B. C.
The address of Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper at a meeting of the Junior Conservative club, on the evening of the 5th of February last, is worthy of some passing comment, especially as it took place immediately after what was practically a conservative defeat in this constituency. Usually a forcible able, and interesting speaker, Sir Charles was not happy in his criticism of the Laurier Government. The old cry that the Liberals since the advent to power have been wearing the "Conservative clothes" becomes more and more hollow as the years go by. It cannot be denied that the National prosperity has been greater since the Liberals came into power, than was experienced before in the history of Canada. No doubt Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper and all Tories would be delighted to see the present Government applying a radical free trade policy at once to the Dominion, but they must remember that the men at the head of the present Government are practical statesmen, not theorists. Free trade may yet come to as full degree as its most ardent advocates could desire, but that will be when other conditions prevail than exist at present. In the mean time that which was good in the old Conservative policy they may be sure will be retained and used by the Liberal Government, while what is bad, and there was much that was bad, will remain unemployed. The fact, that under the Conservative Government many thousands fled from Canada, under the present government tens of thousands are flocking to her borders, cannot be denied. Sir Charles' charges of corruption are as general and ineffective as his other criticisms. He refers to the stand he took in regard to alleged maladministration in the Yukon, but must remember that those charges disappeared before inquiry like mists before the sun, and Sir Charles himself gained no personal prestige by his course in this matter. It is feared that Sir Charles' memory has become blunted in respect of past political events, when he says that the old Conservative government was ever ready to assist in the ventilation and correction of public abuses. His memory must be very bad if he has entirely forgotten that for year after year nearly every department in the old government lent its best efforts to conceal corruption instead of eradicating it, until it became impossible any longer to hide the mass of political filth, and the country concluded that the only thing to do in order to clean the public offices and restore the good name of the country, was to get rid of the whole aggregation of boodlers and bandits. This was done, and some of these went to the penitentiary while others retired into the seclusion of private life there to remain. The Conservative parliamentary party are today suffering for the sins of their political forefathers, and they have not yet by any means, undergone their full term of expiration. Sir Hibbert, although blind to some things, professes to see indications of disintegration and decay in the Liberal ranks since the accession to office of Sir Wilfred Laurier, but the public at large have not such perceptive faculties.

The election to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of the late Hon G R Maxwell, in the House of Commons, was held on the 4th of February last. There were three candidates in the field:—Ex-governor McInnis, Cris. Foley and R G MacPherson.

MacPherson being the straight government candidate the Tories had a nice scheme laid to defeat him. The talk was, they would not bring out any candidate, as it wasn't any use sending an opposition member at the present time, and some were not going to vote at all. Dr McInnis had a grievance against the government which he wished to air. Cris. Foley was brought out as a Labor Union man. Now the Tories thought by uniting their strength with the Union on the they would certainly defeat the government candidate, but they got left, as MacPherson was elected by a good majority, while the Dr lost his deposit. The candidates were all of one mind on the Oriental question viz. the exclusion of the Japs and Chinamen. Now, this fact is very apparent. The white people here give employment to these people. Not only the capitalists but the laborers as well, even those that make the most noise about the Chinks and Japs, will hire a Chink, as the Chinaman is called, to saw wood if he will do it for 10 cents a cord less than any one else. They also patronize the restaurants that are kept by the Japs and Chinamen, although there are restaurants that employ white labor only, and they do it simply because they can get just as good meals for less money. The people here are almost unanimous for the exclusion of the orientals, that is, they want the Dominion government to prohibit the importation of them, while they



encourage them to come by patronizing them and giving them employment. When I lived in Woodstock, not many years ago, a Chinaman came there and started a laundry, but he did not remain very long. Why? because he was not patronized. These facts must be very apparent to the government, and they can't fail to see the inconsistency of the people here on the Pacific coast. I may have more to say about the Chinks in my next.
